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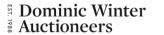



Dominic Winter Auctioneers are pleased to offer for sale the complete and extensive library of the renowned military historian and collector Brian Russell (1940-2022) covering the military history of India in the colonial period.

Brian became interested in Indian culture at a very early age, when he became a pen pal of Joginder Sabharwal of Delhi, through the Wide World Brotherhood, a friendship network founded in 1949. A subsequent invitation to stay with the Sabharwals was eagerly accepted, and Brian set sail for India with a cine camera and paintbrushes in 1959. While there he met his future wife, Nirmal, the younger sister of Joginder, whom he subsequently married in 1964. Brian formally converted to the Sikh religion, and, having settled with his wife in England, returned to India with her numerous times over the following half-century. In this time they travelled the length and breadth of the sub-continent, recording and documenting the graves of thousands of civil and military personnel in India's British cemeteries, many of which had slowly dilapidated or been vandalized over previous decades.

Brian formed a world-class collection of militaria relating to British India, including medals, military uniforms, badges and swords, as well as this fine library of scarce and important historical and antiquarian texts from the 18th century onwards, which is offered in its entirety in this sale.

Highlights include the album of 20 fine hand-coloured lithographic views of Lahore and Amritsar, Original Sketches in the Punjaub. By a Lady, privately published in 1854 (lot 89), illustrated on the front cover of the sale catalogue, the large folio first edition of 26 tinted lithograph plates (on 20 sheets) by George Francklin Atkinson (lot 9), entitled *The Campaign in India 1857-58*, from drawings made during the eventful period of the Great Mutiny, by George Francklin Atkinson, Captain, Bengal Engineers, illustrating the military operations before Delhi and its neighbourhood, issued by Day & Son in 1859, a quarto first edition (lot 62) of Edward lves' Voyage from England to India in the Year MDCCLIV and an Historical Narrative of the Squadron and Army in India, under the command of Vice-Admiral Watson and Colonel Clive, in the years 1755, 1756, 1757; including correspondence between the Admiral and the Nabob Serajah Dowlah (London: Edward and Charles Dilly, 1773), as well as a multitude of scarce Indian regimental histories, a substantial number of East India Registers and Army Lists, and contemporary eye-witness accounts of the various Anglo-Indian wars of the period, including the tumultuous uprising of 1857-58.

Published in the aftermath of the brutal suppression of the Sepoy Mutiny. George Francklin Atkinson was born in 1822, and commissioned 2nd Lieutenant in the Bengal Engineers on 11 December 1840, Lieutenant, 30 November 1844, and Captain, 19 November 1855. He was on furlough in 1858-59 and died in Paris on 15 December 1859. His well-known "Curry & Rice" on forty plates; or, the ingredients of social life at "our station" in India, a satirical work illustrating the lives of British colonialists in India, was published in the same year as the present work.



In 1857 Sir Edward Lugard returned to India to the appointment of Adjutant General. No sooner had he taken up this post than mutiny broke out in the Army of Bengal, on the 10th May, an event recorded by British historians as the Great Sepoy Mutiny of 1857-1858. Sir Edward was given command of the 2nd Division of Infantry, which he led in fierce battles to rescue the garrison at Lucknow. (1)



Burnes arrived in Bombay in 1821 "and was successful in the open competition for the office of surgeon to the residency of Cutch. He volunteered to accompany the force which, in 1825, expelled the Sindians who had devastated Cutch and forced the British brigade to retire to Bhuj. The amirs of Sind then invited him to visit them as 'the most skilful of physicians and their best friend, and the cementer of the bonds of amity between the two governments', and on his return he was complimented by the government on the zeal and ability he had displayed at Cutch and Hyderabad. His account of his visit to Sind, written as an official report to the resident at Cutch, is an excellent account of the country, and was a valuable contribution to the geography of India" (ODNB). 





A courageous, resourceful but ruthless military commander, Major-General Robert Clive became the first British Governor of the Bengal Presidency, using his political and military influence to amass a personal fortune. Clive's uncertain reputation was neatly encapsulated in Thomas Macaulay's famous description of him: "Clive, like most men who are born with strong passions and tried by strong temptations, committed great faults, but every person who takes a fair and enlightened view of his whole career must admit that our island, so fertile in heroes and statesmen, has scarcely ever produced a man more truly great either in arms or in council."

Given Clive of India's inclination for political machination, his ownership of this first-hand account by the Catholic perjuror Miles Prance, who became embroiled in the infamous but fictitious Popish Plot conspiracy to assassinate King Charles II, is unsurprising. On the news of the death of Sir Edmund Berry Godfrey in 1678, Miles Prance became an object of suspicion. Imprisoned in Newgate, Prance confessed and recanted several times, resulting in the execution of Henry Berry, Robert Green, and Lawrence Hill for the murder. It is likely the three men executed were innocent. (1)







The second publication included in this bound volume is a rare propaganda publication printed at the British military base at Fort St. George in Calcutta, which provides transcriptions of `secret' documents that the British apparently found in the Palace of Seringapatam, including Tippoo Sultuan's correspondence with the French. When the French army under Napoleon made a push for India in 1798, the British attacked Tippoo's forces, igniting the Fourth Anglo-Mysore War. This publication sought to discredit the Tiger of Mysore as a traitor and includes correspondence between Tipu and the French, as well as the ruler of what was to become Afghanistan, Zaman Shah Durrani. 
From his fortress at Seringapatam, an island fort in the river Kaveri just north of Mysore, Tipu held a last stand against the British, led by Colonel Wellesley, later Duke of Wellington. The battle made Wellesley's military career, and he remained in India as Governor of Seringatapam for five years. Tipu was killed during fierce fighting, and according to Wellesley's biographer, Elizabeth Longford, was 'shot dead by a British soldier who fancied the jewel in his turban'.

The first plate shows East India Company forces capturing Seringapatam, the fortress capital of Tipu Sultan on the 4th of May 1799, the second plate depicts the two sons of Tipu Sultan descending the steps of the palace towards a group of English officers led by Major General Baird. (2)

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



Moir vividly told the story of his experience for his children in his Agra in the Mutiny (1896). Soon there was neither government nor revenue; but as head of the intelligence department Muir held the dangerous position of centre of communication between the viceroy, Lord Canning, and the civil and military authorities right across India to Delhi, Lahore, and Peshawar, to Gwalior, Indore, and Bombay. 
Fanny Parks (née Frances Susanna Archer, 1794-1875) arrived in India in 1822, as the wife of Charles Crawford Parkes, a civil servant in the East India Company. Stationed at Allahabad, she travelled extensively, often on her own, visiting Agra, Fatehgarh, Cawnpore, Meerut, Delhi, and Landour in the Himalayas. As a woman she was able to enter the Zenana, witnessing marriage and religious ceremonies not reported on by male writers. Unlike most of her English female contemporaries in India, she immersed herself in Indian culture, making this one of the most readable travel memoirs of the period. According to ODNB " Her fluent Hindustani enabled her to penetrate Indian life, and she adopted some Indian customs, signing her writing and drawings in Persian script... and playing the sitar." 


Kibo from the S.E. View from Camp on the Saddle Plateau (14,200 ft.)




