A rare work from the early period of George Richmond's career, executed just before the artist's elopement with Julia Tatham. Richmond enrolled at the Royal Academy at the age of 15, where he met Samuel Palmer, and at 16 was introduced to William Blake. Their meeting had a profound effect on the young artist, and in 1824 Richmond, along with Palmer, Edward Calvert, Frederick Tatham, and others, formed the Blakeinfluenced group known as 'The Ancients'. The figure in the present work may well have been modelled on Samuel Palmer, who was known to dress in unconventional 'revivalist' clothing.

The first edition of this atlas was published in separate parts - thus the first and second volumes have their own title pages and dates. The first volume deals with the historical development of cosmography, geology, astronomy, oceanography and winds, and illustrates this with a series of plates of globes, spheres, continents and astronomical systems. The second volume is dedicated to historical geography and mapping, having 84 maps and illustrative plates. The next volume to be published covered contemporary geography, but this is not present here. Desnos announced a final volume but this was never published.

'Nicholas Tindal translated this history of Turkey into English from Cantemir's Latin manuscript brought to England by his son Antiochus, who was Russian ambassador to England. Cantemir himself served as Hospodar of Moldavia in 1710. His history was considered authoritative, and it was only superseded by von Hammer's monumental history of the Ottoman Empire'. (Atabey)







This account was published two years before the official narrative. Captain Clerke, in his dying letter to Sir Joseph Banks, commended Ellis, but Ellis forfeited Banks's regard by publishing his account of the voyage in contravention of the Admiralty's instruction to surrender all journals and logs.' (Hill).

The French explorer and collector Robert Hottot made several long expeditions through Africa and the Far East during his twenties. This Congo expedition was his third one made to central Africa and had on this occasion the endorsement of the French government. The expedition's aim was the exploration of the Kanem region east of Lake Chad, an area largely uncharted by Africa's colonial powers up to that time. The expedition lasted nearly fourteen months and its members faced difficult conditions and hostile threats as they travelled overland and by river from Brazzaville to Lake Chad, some two thousand kilometres through what is now the People's Republic of the Congo, Democratic Republic of the Congo, Central African Republic and Chad. Hottot was accompanied by three other men on the expedition: Albert Guinard who returned home after falling ill shortly after the expedition began; Léon Poutrin who acted as doctor and later published several contributions to African ethnography; and Georges Barbat who did not survive the expedition.

A large collection of photographs, equipment and documents (including diaries kept by Robert Hottot from 4 June 1906 to 2 March 1908) relating to the expedition was donated to the Pitt Rivers Museum, Oxford, in 1994. Objects collected by Hottot are also held by the Musée du Quai Branly, Paris, the British Museum, London, and the Natural History Museum, London. This diary has been in private hands in England for over fifty years. (1)

An important and uncommon work of the Carmelite missions to the orient and Africa (complete set in 4 volumes, a fifth volume was planned but was never published). Three of the four volumes deal with the three important Carmelite missionaries who went to Holyland, Persia, and India in the 17th and 18th centuries: Leandro do Santa Celilia, Juan Tadeo de San Eliseo, and Philippe de La Très Sainte Trinité

Robert Shirley was born in 1581 at Wiston (Sussex) and died in 1628 at Qazvin (Persia). He travelled to Persia in 1598, accompanying his brother, Anthony, who had been sent to Safavid Persia with 5000 horses to train the Persian army according to the rules and customs of the English militia and to reform and retrain the Persian artillery. When Anthony Shirley left Persia, Robert remained in Persia with fourteen other Englishmen. In 1608 Shah Abbas sent Robert on a diplomatic mission to James I of England and to other European princes for the purpose of uniting them in a confederacy against the Ottoman Empire. Shirley travelled with a suite of 18 persons first to Poland, where he was received by Sigismund III Vasa, and from there to Germany, where he received the title of Count Palatine and was appointed Knight of the Holy Roman Empire by Emperor Rudolph II. From Germany, he travelled to Florence and then Rome, where he was received by Pope Paul V. He then went to Spain before returning to Persia in 1613.



This is an example of the slightly smaller and later edition of Gill's original 1913 map. There is a 1924 edition which is assumed to have been altered to help the promotion of the 1924 British Empire Exhibition that was held at Wembley between April and October of that year. It can be identified by a sign saying:-'On To Wembley' and an empire lion in the top left hand corner below the man pushing a bus. This example is a slightly later state with a greyhound replacing the lion. Greyhound racing started at Wembley in 1927 so this edition probably dates from 1927 or 1928. The map remains highly stylised and whimsical and was held in great affection by Londoners. It was originally commissioned by The London Underground and was designed to be displayed in tube stations. The intense pictorial content of the map caught the public's imagination and as a result Gill is often credited with creating a resurgence of the genre of decorative map making. Much work and research has been done by Roderick Barron and Bryars & Bryars on the maps of the Underground and the work of Macdonald Gill and I am also grateful to Claire Dobbins book, London Underground Maps: Art, Design and Cartography. £600 - £800

The first described item is a large and detailed folding map, published during the Peninsular War. Probably because of the war, Nantiat is most exercised with the borders between Spain and Portugal, especially the passes through which it was expected that Napoleon's army might come when the campaign season started in the spring. It is probable that Faden saw an opportunity to sell this detailed and large-scale map to officers in Wellington's army in Portugal, with the idea that it could be used as a reference for the campaign. In July of 1810 - six months after the publication of the map - the French military commander, Marshal Masséna led an army of 65,000 troops into Portugal, pushing on towards Lisbon, but was held back by the Lines of Torres Vedras a set of earthworks that had been built on the orders of Wellington. The campaign - significant for the emergence of large-scale guerrilla warfare - was eventually won by the British under the command of Lt. Gen. Sir Arthur Wellesley, later the 1st Duke of Wellington. It could be argued that the French defeat was sealed when Napoleon set out with a massive army on what proved to be the disastrous French invasion of Russia. This seriously depleted the French forces with the result that a combined allied army under Wellesley pushed into Spain, defeating the French at Salamanca and taking Madrid. In the following year, Wellington scored a decisive victory over King Joseph Bonaparte's army in the Battle of Vitoria. Pursued by the armies of Britain, Spain and Portugal, Marshal Jean-de-Dieu Soult, no longer able to get sufficient support from a depleted France, led the exhausted and demoralized French forces in a fighting withdrawal across the Pyrenees during the winter of 1813/1814. France, Napoleon and its European dominance would finally fall the following year at the battle of Waterloo.

Cosmographia...,' created under the direction of Conrad Swenheym (who apprenticed with Guttenberg), and published after Swenheym's death (1477), by Arnold Buckinck.

Rodney Shirley: "The new copper plates engraved at Rome for the 1478 edition of Ptolemy's 'Geography' are much superior in clarity and craftsmanship to those of the Bologna edition. There is evidence that work on the Rome edition had been started in 1473 or 1474, and several of the plates may well have been engraved before those printed [by Taddeo Crivelli] at Bologna in 1477. The printing was carried out by two skilled printers of German origin: Conrad Sweynheym and his successor Arnold Buckinck; the publisher was Domitius Calderinus. Many consider the Rome plates to be the finest Ptolemaic plates produced until Gerard Mercator engraved his classical world atlas of 1578."



A scarce Spanish edition of Gill's 'Time and Tide' map. Commissioned by Time and Tide magazine, it never enjoyed a large circulation and is therefore one of the scarcest of Gill's pictorial maps. The map celebrates the joint declaration released by Churchill and Roosevelt in August 1941 after the Atlantic Conference. The Atlantic Charter was a gesture of solidarity at a moment when Nazi Germany had just turned against the USSR and looked all but invincible. In time the charter would form the basis for Allied war aims and the postwar foundation of the United Nations. Gill takes an optimistic view of the Charter and of the future. He shows a muscled worker taking a sledgehammer to tanks and munitions in the foreground, while in the distance is an idyllic scene of ploughing and reaping. A nod to the book of Isiah and the turning of 'swords to ploughshares'. The map is adorned with quotes by Cicero, Emerson, Pope and Aristotle on the virtues of peace. Gill is probably best known for his 1913 'Wonderground map of London' and this map is still very much in the decorative and pictorial style that Gill became famous for. I am grateful to the research and blogs conducted and written by Rod Barron and Bryars & Bryars.



Tomás, Chevalier O'Gorman or Thomas O'Gorman (1732-1809) was an Irish soldier and genealogist. He was born in Castletown, County Clare, the son of Patrick O'Gorman with his first language being Irish. He was educated as a Medical Doctor at the Irish College, Paris and served with the Irish Brigade in the French army. He was created Chevalier by Louis XV. O'Gorman married a daughter of Count d'Eon, and from him inherited vast vineyards, which were lost in the French Revolution whereupon he retired to Ireland, where he pursued his antiquarian studies. From about 1764 he corresponded with the Irish antiquary Charles O'Conor (1710-1791) and compiled an impressive collection of Irish manuscripts. He also compiled pedigrees of Irish expatriates and also personally arranged for the Book of Ballymote to be given by the Irish College to the Royal Irish Academy in Dublin.



Provenance: The 1388 & 1390 documents have paper labels with the document date, number '107' and the ownership name of Scheuch. Frederick C. These two documents, and possibly all of them, would seem therefore to have one time belonged to Scheuch who had acquired a collection of over 275 Latin and Catalan charters, sometime before 1895, from his father Herman Scheuch. 



275* Spanish Lawsuit. A manuscript document concerning an ongoing lawsuit involving the village of Herreros, in Soria, Spain, 1588, the cover sheet translating roughly as follows, 'Herreros, Soria. Certification issued at the request of the village of Herreros, by an escribino de camara of the Real Chancilleria at Valladolid, 27 June 1588, 'No. 16", the first page of main text begins: 'En la villa de Valladolid a veinte e cinco dias del mes de junio de myll e quinientos e ochenta e ocho años estando los señores presidente e oydores de la audiencia del rrey nuestro señor en audiencia publica Andres de Vallejo en nombre del concejo e vecinos del lugar de Herreros e por ante mi [...] de Rrocas escriuano de camara de la dicha audiencia presento una peticion firmada de su nombre del tenor syguiente: Muy Poderoso Señor: Andres de Vallejo en nombre del concejo e vecinos del lugar de Herreros en el pleito que trata con el consejo de la Mesta y [...] vecinos del lugar de Abejar (?) digo que para presentar ante un juez executor que executa una executoria...', the opposition apparently being the Mesta and the village of Abejar (pp. 2 & 3), the final page a receipt for payment for a land transaction at Herreros, dated 5 February 1588, a total of 100 leaves including 3 blanks, written in a neat but difficult hand to rectos and versos throughout, laid paper (one leaf with watermark 'CATALYUNA'), some spotting and damp staining, occasional marginal fraying with a little text loss, partly stitched and loosely contained in the remains of a contemporary vellum wrapper with heavily rubbed rubricated text, identified 'No. 3' to upper wrapper, folio (31 x 21 cm)

An unusual manuscript document seemingly written shortly before the Spanish Armada expedition that took place 21 July to August 1588. A large part of the municipal archives for Abejar were destroyed in a fire in the nineteenth century. The Mesta was a very important organisation which protected livestock owners and their animals in the Crown of Castile but was incorporated in the thirteenth century and dissolved in 1836. The Mesta was best known for its organisation of the annual migration of transhumant sheep, particularly those of the merino breed. The flocks and herds of all species of livestock in Castile and their owners were under the oversight of the Mesta, including both the transhumant and the sedentary ones.

276* Walker (Patrick Gordon, 1907-1980). British Labour Party politician and Cabinet Minister. An extraordinary post bag of over 500 mostly autograph and some typed letters signed, sent to Gordon Walker after his seat loss at the 1965 Leyton by-election on 21 January 1965, including some correspondence concerning other resignations and appointments 1965/1967, the correspondents including politicians, Labour Party colleagues, academics, publishers, friends and constituents, etc., various lengths and sizes Gordon Walker had become Foreign Secretary in the Labour government after the 1964 general election, under Harold Wilson. However, Gordon Walker was defeated in controversial circumstances by the Conservative candidate Peter Griffiths at that election, running, in part, an antiimmigration campaign. In spite of not being an MP Gordon Walker was appointed to the Foreign Office, and to resolve the unusual situation he stood for the safe Labour constituency of Leyton in January 1965. However, Gordon Walker lost the contest to the Conservative Party candidate, Ronald Buxton, who won with a majority of 205 votes. The letters here are largely an outpouring of condolences for the loss of that election and gratitude for all his work. Gordon Walker did retake the Leyton seat in 1966, remaining in office until 1974, during which time he was given further ministerial roles. (approx. 500+) £100 - £200

277* World War Two. An archive of letters, postcards and documents, together with two photograph albums, relating to Leopold Koller, a Viennese police officer who served in the German police in Poland during the early years of the Second World War (Cracow by January 1940, and Lodz, called Litzmannstadt, during 1941) with the Mounted Detachment of the Cracow Police Department, circa 1939-1941, comprising approximately 45 letters in pencil or ink, in a typical German gothic handwriting style, from Leo Koller to his wife Elisabeth (Elli) and daughter Helene (Helli), 58 postcards (a few unused, and including some post-war, addressed to Wilfried, and also Peter Cope in Liverpool), and several other related documents (2 birth certificates, in German and English, for daughter Helene, Viennese streckenkarte for Helene for 1945, and a photograph of Wilfried in policeman's uniform dated Liverpool 1947), all contained in 2 small boxes, together with a related photograph album, with manuscript pictorial title 'Meiner kleine Helli zur Erinnerung, Krakau Dez. 1939', containing approximately 85 photographs of family and holidays (much dating from 1945 and 1946), all with handwritten captions in German, original clothbacked carved wooden boards, lightly rubbed, small oblong 4to (18 x 23.5 cm)

This group of letters, postcards and documents relates to the Viennese family of Leo Koller, his wife Elisabeth (Elli) and their daughter Helene (Helli), born in1927. The family were Catholic. Elisabeth was born in Cracow (1904)









and her parents were not German. Leo (born 1898) was already serving in the Austrian police at the time of his daughter's birth. After the Anschluss he served in the German police which was increasingly dominated by the SS. By January 1940 he was in Cracow and the following year served in Lodz, He worked in mounted formations. Despite his long police service, in early 1940 he was still only a sergeant (Hauptwachtmeister). The letters and postcards (1939-1941) are all from Leo to his wife and daughter. Although he mentions receiving correspondence from his wife this does not appear to have survived. A partial inspection of the correspondence suggests that the content focuses on domestic matters, including food, leave arrangements and travel movements, with little (unsurprisingly) on the murderous Nazi occupation of Poland. It seems Leo and Elli had a stormy relationship. On one occasion he tells his daughter he is coming to Vienna on leave but does not know where he is staying, so obviously not with his wife at the family home. On another, he wants his wife to do his laundry and tells her that if she has no time for him she won't be hearing from him again. There is also a hand-written letter of uncertain date from the Mounted Detachment of the Cracow Police Regiment informing Frau Koller of Leo's death. This interesting archive requires further close examination.

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

George Jacob Holyoake (1817-1906) was an English freethinker, co-operator and newspaper editor. Holyoake founded The Reasoner which ran from 1846 until 1861 and out of which came a new movement which in 1851 he called secularism. His acquaintances included John Stuart Mill, George Henry Lewes, Francis Newman and Harriet Martineau. Ellen (Eveline) Lallah Holyoake (1841-1919) was his second daughter who married Edward Praill.

Holyoake was one of the first parliamentary candidates to give a prominent position to the woman question in his manifesto. He urged women like Harriet Martineau to start a woman-movement, even suggesting the title of a paper (Women's Journal) that was adopted later.
