Rare. 'Relatively little is known about Mrs. Belnos. Her husband, Jean-Jacques Belnos, was a French miniaturist and lithographer, who had travelled to India in 1807, and established a practice in Calcutta as a painter of miniatures and portraits of the British, a business which his widow seems to have continued following his death' (De Silva, Colonial Self-Fashioning in British India, c.1785-1845, pp. 106-7). Abbey speculates that Mrs Belnos was Indian, but she was in fact almost certainly the daughter of William Moore, assistant surgeon in the Bengal army. This seems to be her second and last published work, following Twenty four Plates Illustrative of Hindoo and European Manners in Bengal, which appeared in 1832.



A complete set of one of the great travel narratives of the 18th century. 'In conformity with 18th-century conventions of travel writing, it is an "immethodical miscellany", ranging from striking adventure stories, reported dialogues, and Shandean asides boasting of [Bruce's] success with African women, through a pedantic history of ancient Ethiopia (which occupies most of the first two volumes), to vivid sketches of contemporary Abyssinian life, politics, and natural history. It was immensely successful, most of the original edition being sold to retail booksellers within thirty-two hours, and was rapidly translated into French and German' (ODNB).

'Charles II had asked the Earl of Castlemaine to keep him informed of events while he toured Europe, and on Castlemaine's arrival in Venice he sent the King a long letter of information on the war in Crete between the Venetians and the Turks, which was then entering its final phase. When Castlemaine returned to England he received permission to print the letter, which is a basic source of information on the 20-year battle in Crete' (Blackmer).





These thirteen prints were issued bound and with two text-leaves including a title-page and perhaps a list of plates, but no other text. The work is rare: three copies traced in libraries world-wide (one at the British Library and two at the V&A); one other copy has appeared at auction in the last 50 years. 'Sir Harry Darell served with the 18th Royal Irish on the China Expedition, as aide-de-camp to Brigadier-General Burrell, and was present at the first taking of Chusan (medal). He served also with the 7th Dragoon Guards against the insurgent Boers in South Africa in 1845; also during the whole of the Kaffir war of 1846-7, and commanded the squadron of his regiment at the Gwanga, on the 8th June, 1846, and received two severe wounds in the charge an attack, and his charger wounded in five places' (The New Army List, No. XLI, 1849, p. 27 n. 3).

Although 'The Troops Crossing the Great Fish River' has the imprint of Ackermann in addition to that of Day & Son it is original to the work.



He was part of the supporting group (along with William Lashly and Thomas Crean) forced to turn back 160 miles from the Pole, leaving Scott and his party to continue his ill-fated attempt on the Pole.

Leonard Hussey (1891-1964) was the meteorologist on Ernest Shackleton's Trans-Antarctic Expedition of 1914-17 and one of the 22 men left on Elephant Island whilst Shackleton embarked on his epic rescue mission to South Georgia.

E.W. Kevin Walton (1918-2009) was a member of the British Antarctic Survey, and in 1946 famously rescued Major John Tonkin who had fallen into a crevasse, winning the Albert Medal.

Unprecedented in its scope and content, Horsburgh's pilot was first published in 1809-11, as Directions for Sailing to and from the East Indies. All editions are rare. We trace four institutional copies only with both volumes in second edition: King's College London, Leiden, the Defensie Bibliotheken (Breda) and the Bayerische Staatsbibliothek; copies at Tübingen and the Staatsbibliothek Berlin cited by WorldCat appear to belong to the third edition of 1826-7; a few other copies appear to contain volume one in third edition (1826) bound with a second edition of volume two. The Supplement is present in the KCL and Leiden copies, catalogued as containing 52 and 48 pages respectively; Berkeley and University of California NRLF each hold a separate copy of the Supplement, both with 50 pages, as in our copy; a copy at Yale lacks all after page 32.

Bound in at the rear of volume one in our copy, and apparently not accounted for by library collations, is a single-leaf appendix (chi1) titled 'Discoveries in the Gulf of Persia' and mentioning Abu Dhabi ('Boothabeen'), Dubai, Sir Bani Yas and other areas in the modern United Arab Emirates. The Supplement contains a near full-page notice on Bahrain (p. 26), as well as covering the south coast of China, the Yellow Sea, Formosa, and elsewhere.

Dy E. ½ E. distant 5 or 6 miles. No fresh water was discovered on the island, but from ravines occasioned by heavy rains, water might probably be got by digging wells. The soil consists of a metallic substance, on which grow only a few herbs, but no trees, and the southern side of the island is very rugged, its western extremity terminating in a low sandy point.

George Nicholson was from a family of artists, and following his father's premature death in 1814, hastened by anxieties over debt, the whole family engaged in artistic work. Mr. Nicholson, who had been a school master in Manchester and a typographer in Liverpool, was a self-taught wood engraver. and had given both George and his brother, Samuel, instruction in drawing and engraving. Their mother executed skilful copies of well-known pictures hand-embroidered on silk, and their sister, Isabella, exhibited botanical watercolours and landscapes at the Liverpool Academy of Art between 1829 and 1845. George himself also exhibited there some 50 drawings between 1827 and 1838, mostly landscapes in watercolour or pencil. 

A rare prospect of Krakow, less common than most of the other plans in the 'Civitates Orbis Terrarum' because it only appeared in the sixth and last volume and its size and the fact that it was folded predicated against it surviving in good condition. It shows the city from the west, with the neighbouring towns of Kazimierz & Kleparz. Their names are given on banners in the sky alongside their armorials. It is possible that the scene in the foreground represents the entry of the Polish king accompanied by knights and ecclesiastical dignitaries. The banderole celebrating Cracow as the royal residence would seem to confirm this, however, Georg Braun was ill-informed, for Cracow had been replaced as the capital by Warsaw under Sigismund III between 1596 and 1611 (Taschen).



The set of French army uniforms was originally published in 'Historiques et Uniformes de l'armée Française'. The Spooner lithograph depicts the 17th Lancers (Duke of Cambridge's Own). This was a cavalry regiment of the British Army, raised in 1759 and notable for its participation in the Charge of the Light Brigade during the Crimean War. The regiment was amalgamated with the 21st Lancers to form the 17th/21st Lancers in 1922. Known as the 'Death or Glory Boys', their cap badge is a skull and crossbones. After further amalgamation with the 16th/5th The Queen's Royal Lancers in 1993, they now form the Queen's Royal Lancers. The first caricature shows two officers in dress uniform; one is a Life Guard or Dragoon, the other a Hussar. They are both drunkenly déshabillé and are presumably returning from the Waterloo banquet at Apsley House. The second item illustrates a scene on a high-road passing through a village. The velocipede rider is being attacked by a vet and a blacksmith, both of whom regard mechanical transport as a threat to their livelihoods. The vet squirts a large syringe into the mouth of the dandy whilst the blacksmith smashes the velocipede with a large hammer. In the middle distance, another rider is attacked by a man with a pitchfork. (18)

The King and Queen of the Sandwich Islands - the modern-day Hawaiian Islands - visited England in 1824, hoping to meet King George IV to ask that the islands be placed under the protection of the British Crown. The trip cost them their lives. The British press was fascinated by the royal party and although regarding them as 'exotic savages', avidly reported their visits to the theatre, the opera and exhibitions. Sadly both the King and Queen contracted measles - a disease they would never have been exposed to and the queen died on July 8, 1824, at the age of 22, with the King dying a few days later on July 14, 1824, at the age of 27. King George would eventually grant an audience with the remaining members of the party and promised the Sandwich Islands protection against foreign aggression. On September 29, the frigate, HMS Blonde, left Portsmouth carrying the Sandwich Islanders and the remains of their late King and Queen back to their island home.





The Canterbury & Whitstable Railway opened in 1830 and was the first public passenger railway in the world and the first to carry passengers by steam. However, there was only one single track. Locke & Dixon were engineers under the direction of George Stephenson. Robert Stephenson & Co made the locomotive "Invicta" which hauled two trains at the opening. After the sale of "Invicta" in 1839, the line was worked by stationary engines before experiments were made with the "Atmospheric system. The Canterbury & Whitstable Railway was purchased by the South Eastern Railway in 1853 and the line closed in 1931. Robert Stephenson attended on the Opening Day and was a guest of honour at the dinner for over 150 people held at the Kings Head Hotel, Canterbury. Mr Robert Stephenson wrote on 6th May 1830 "I returned from Canterbury on Tuesday. The opening of the Canterbury Railway went off remarkably well without a single mishap".

This first incarnation of the Eddystone lighthouse was designed by Henry Winstanley (1644–1703) in 1696 and completed in 1699. It was a timber building and the first to be built on the Eddystone Rocks. The rocks were a major hazard to shipping and are some nine miles off Rame Head at the approach to Plymouth Sound. Winstanley – a successful businessman and ship owner – had lost two ships on the Eddystone and this undoubtedly encouraged him to find a solution. A violent storm on the night of 26 November 1703 destroyed the lighthouse, killing the light-keepers, the workmen and Winstanley himself. It was replaced in 1709 by an oak and iron lighthouse designed by John Rudyerd, which survived until 1755 when was destroyed in a fire. The third attempt, also known as Smeaton's Tower stood until 1877 and its upper portion now stands on Plymouth Hoe as a monument. The current, fourth, lighthouse was designed by James Douglas, using Robert Stevenson's developments of Smeaton's techniques and opened in 1882.



Goding's Brewery (or Lion Brewery) was built in 1836, to a design by Francis Edwards. The Goding family brewery, headed by Thomas Goding, was very successful during the nineteenth century. The site was particularly desirable as there was a waterworks nearby, which the Godings bought and incorporated into the brewery in 1853. The water used for brewing was sourced from the five wells inside the building. The brewery was taken over in 1924 by the brewers Hoare and Co., of Wapping, and was badly damaged by fire in 1931. It remained derelict until it was demolished in 1949. The Royal Festival Hall stands in its place today and the only evidence of the original brewery is the large lion visible on the top of the building, made of artificial Coade stone and is known as the South Bank Lion.



Hugh Broughton (1549–1612) was one of the outstanding Hebrew scholars of his generation, and immensely learned not only in biblical Hebrew but also in the Talmud and other Rabbinic writings; he knew many Jewish scholars during his residence abroad. For many years he advocated a new translation of the Bible into English but in fact it was John Rainolds, an old adversary, who in 1604 put in motion the efforts which led to the Authorised Version of 1611. Educated at Cambridge, he studied Hebrew under Chevallier or Cevallerius and became a fellow of St John's College. He was appointed to a prebendal stall at Durham in 1578, which he later resigned, coming to settle in London where he worked as a private tutor for some years before going to Germany in 1589. Essentially he remained abroad for the rest of his life, returning to England only to die.

The Spanish version includes the stipulation that Dutch ships are required to lower their flags to the English when in English waters, in recognition of the Navigation Act of 1651. The Italian text refers to the payment of one million scudi by the Dutch to cover the cost of the war, and to trade routes with both the West and East Indies, the text ending 'Questo e quello che mi raccordo di piu d'Importanza.'. Algernon Percy, 4th Duke of Northumberland (1792 -1865) was the second son of Hugh, 2nd Duke of Northumberland, and his second wife, Frances Julia, daughter of Peter Burrell Esq. of Beckenham in Kent. He was a distinguished naval officer and a man of science and learning, who rose to the rank of Admiral, and was First Lord of the Admiralty in 1852. The ministry lapsed in January 1853, when he was made a Knight of the Garter. He was created Baron Prudhoe 27 November 1816, and succeeded his brother Hugh as Duke of Northumberland in 1847. On his succession to the Dukedom, he devoted his considerable fortune to the development of his estates, building several churches, providing lifeboats, and education for the children of fishermen and seafarers. He travelled the Middle East, and was particularly interested in Egyptian antiquities. He married secondly, 25 August 1842, Eleanor Grosvenor, eldest daughter of Richard, 2nd Marquess of Westminster, but they had no children and on his death the Barony of Prudhoe became extinct, the Barony of Percy devolved on his grandnephew and heir general John James Hugh, 7th Duke of Atholl, and the Dukedom of Northumberland passed to his cousin George, 2nd Earl of Beverley. Rare. Tryon's writings, a medley of mystical philosophy and dietetics seem curiously relevant today, advocating as they do, amongst other things, vegetarianism, temperance, meditation, conservation of the natural world and cleanness of living. Born in the bucolic village of Bibury, Gloucestershire, Tyron had no formal education, but was a spinner and a shepherd in his youth, teaching himself to read and write. At the age of 18 he left Bibury without telling his parents and travelled on foot to London with £3 savings, where he became a hatter. Although Tyron eventually became a successful businessman and trading merchant he managed not to compromise his mystical beliefs. He had a horror of war, advocated animal rights, and was shocked by the cruelty of slavery which he saw at first hand when he travelled to Barbados. In the last two decades of his life he published 27 works on a wide range of subjects, including education, nutrition, abstinence from alcohol and tobacco, and treatment of slaves. Benjamin Franklin was greatly influenced by his The Way to Health, Long Life and Happiness, and his dietary ideas were largely plagiarised by Joseph Ritson in his Essay on Abstinence from Animal Food, published in 1802. Playwright Aphra Behn, and Percy Bysshe Shelley were also advocates of Tyron's writings.

Zeppelin's annotations provide interesting responses to the criticisms levelled by Major Gross at Zeppelin's airship designs. Where Gross suggests that Zeppelin's airship requires several days of assembly, Zepplin notes 'Unsinn!' ['Nonsense!'], and on page 21, where Gross concludes that the trial flights for the LZ3 were 'gleamingly successful', Zeppelin comments 'na also!' [there you go!]. In other places Zeppelin puts forward alternative ideas to Gross's own proposals.

AFTER THE AUCTION

Online Results: If you weren't present or able to follow the auction live, you can find results for the sale on our website shortly after the sale has ended.

Payment: The price you pay is the amount at which the auctioneer's hammer falls (the hammer price), plus a buyer's premium (a percentage of the final hammer price) and vat where applicable. You will be issued with an invoice made out to the name and address provided on your registration form.

Please note successful bids made via live bidding cannot be invoiced or paid for until the day after an auction. A live bidding fee of 3% + VAT (Invaluable) or 4.95% + VAT (the-saleroom) will be added to your invoice.

METHODS OF PAYMENT

Cheque: Cheques will only be accepted on the day of the sale by prior arrangement (please contact our office for further information). Cheques by post will be accepted but a period of 5 working days will be required for the cheque to clear before purchases can be collected or posted.

Cash: Payments can be made at the Cashier's Office, either during or after the sale.

Debit Card: There is no additional charge for purchases made with debit cards in the UK.

Credit Cards: We accept Visa and Mastercard. It is advisable to let your card provider know in advance if you are intending to purchase. This reduces the time needed to obtain authorisation when the payment is made.

Bank Transfer: All transfers must state the relevant invoice number. If transferring from a foreign currency, the amount we receive must be the total due after the currency conversion and the deduction of any bank charges.

Note to Overseas Clients: All payments must be made by bank transfer only. No card payments will be accepted unless by special prior arrangements with the auctioneers.

Collection/Postage/Delivery: If you attend the auction in person and are successful in your bid, you are free to collect your item once payment has been made.

Successful commission or live bids will be invoiced to you the day after the sale. When it is possible for our in-house packing department to send your purchase(s), a charge for postage/packing/insurance will be included in your invoice. Where it is not possible for our in-house packing department to send your item you will be required to make your own arrangements or to contact Mailboxes etc (tel: 01793 525009) or Pack and Send (tel: 01635 887237) who may be able to help.

We provide a monthly delivery service to Central London, usually on Wednesday of the week following an auction. Payment must be received before this option can be requested. A charge will be added to your invoice for this service.

ARTIST'S RESALE RIGHT LAW ("DROIT DE SUITE")

Lots marked with AR next to the lot number may be subject to Droit de Suite.

Droit de Suite is payable on the hammer price of any artwork sold in the lifetime of the artist, or within 70 years of the artist's death. The buyer agrees to pay Dominic Winter Auctioneers Ltd. an amount equal to the resale royalty and we will pay such amount to the artist's collecting agent. Resale royalty applies where the Hammer price is 1,000 Euros or more and the amount cannot be more than 12,500 Euros per lot.

The amount is calculated as follows:

Royalty For the Portion of the Hammer Price (in Euros)

4.00% up to 50,000

3.00% between 50,000.01 and 200,000 1.00% between 200,000.01 and 350,000 0.50% between 350,000.01 and 500,000

Invoices will, as usual, be issued in Pounds Sterling. For the purposes of calculating the resale royalty the Pounds Sterling/Euro rate of exchange will be the European Central Bank reference rate on the day of the sale.

CONDITIONS OF SALE AND BUSINESS

- The Seller warrants to the Auctioneer and the buyer that he is the true owner or is properly authorised to sell the property by the true owner and is able to transfer good and marketable title to the property free from any third party claims.
- 2. (a) The highest bidder to be the buyer. If during the auction the Auctioneer considers that a dispute has arisen he has absolute authority to settle it or re-offer the lot. The Auctioneer may at his sole discretion determine the advance of bidding or refuse a bid, divide any lot, combine any two or more lots or withdraw any lot without prior notice.
 - (b) Where goods are bought at auction by a buyer who has entered into an agreement with another or others that the other or others (or some of them) shall abstain from bidding for the goods and the buyer or other party or one of the other parties is a dealer (as defined in the Auction Biddings Agreement Act 1927) the buyer warrants that the goods are bought bona fide on joint account.
- 3. The buyer shall pay the price at which a lot is knocked down by the Auctioneer to the buyer ("the hammer price") together with a premium of 20% of the hammer price. Where the lot is marked by an asterisk the premium will be subject to VAT at 20% which under the Auctioneer's Margin Scheme will form part of the buyer's premium on our invoice and will not be separately identified (the premium added to the hammer price will hereafter collectively be referred to as "the total sum due"). By making any bid the buyer acknowledges that his attention has been drawn to the fact that on the sale of any lot the Auctioneer will receive from the seller commission at its usual rates in addition to the said premium of 20% and assents to the Auctioneer receiving the said commission.
- (a) The buyer shall forthwith upon the purchase give in his name and permanent address and pay to the Auctioneer immediately after the conclusion of the auction the total sum due.
 - (b) The buyer may be required to pay down during the course of the sale the whole or any part of the total sum due, and if he fails to do so after such request the lot or lots may at the Auctioneer's absolute discretion be put up again and resold immediately.
 - (c) The buyer shall at his own expense take away any lot or lots purchased no later than five working days after the auction day.
 - (d) The Auctioneer may at his own discretion agree credit terms with a buyer and extend the time limits for collection in special cases but otherwise payment shall be deemed to have been made only after the Auctioneer has received cash or a sterling banker's draft or the buyer's cheque has been cleared.
- 5. (a) If the buyer fails to pay for or take away any lot or lots pursuant to clause 4 or breaches any other condition of that clause the Auctioneer as agent for the seller shall be entitled after consultation with the seller to exercise one or other of the following rights:
 - (i) Rescind the sale of that or any other lots sold to the buyer who defaults and re-sell the lot or lots whereupon the defaulting buyer shall pay to the Auctioneer any shortfall between the proceeds of that sale after deduction of costs of re-sale and the total sum due. Any surplus shall belong to the seller.
 - (ii) Proceed for damages for breach of contract.
 - (b) Without prejudice to the Auctioneer's rights hereunder if any lots or lots are not collected within five days or such longer period as the Auctioneer may have agreed otherwise, the Auctioneer may charge the buyer a storage charge of £1.00 + VAT at the current rate per lot per day
 - (c) Ownership of the lot purchased shall not pass to the buyer until he has paid to the Auctioneer the total sum due.
- 6. (a) The seller shall be entitled to place a reserve on any lot and the Auctioneer shall have the right to bid on behalf of the seller for any lot on which a reserve has been placed. A seller may not bid on any lot on which a reserve has been placed.
 - (b) Where any lot fails to sell, the Auctioneer shall notify the seller accordingly. The seller shall make arrangements either to re-offer the lot for sale or to collect the lot and may be asked to pay a commission not exceeding 50% of the selling commission and any special expenses incurred in cataloguing the lot.
 - (c) If such arrangements are not made within seven days of the notification the Auctioneer is empowered to sell the lot by auction or by private treaty at not less than the reserve price and to receive from the seller the normal selling commission and special expenses.

- 7. Any representation or statement by the Auctioneer in any catalogue, brochure or advertisement of forthcoming sales as to authorship, attribution, genuineness, origin, date, age, provenance, condition or estimated selling price is a statement of opinion only. Every person interested should exercise and rely on his own judgement as to such matters and neither the Auctioneer nor his servants or agents are responsible for the correctness of such opinions. No warranty whatsoever is given by the Auctioneer or the seller in respect of any lot and any express or implied warranties are hereby excluded.
- 8. (a) Notwithstanding any other terms of these conditions, if within fourteen days of the sale the Auctioneer has received from the buyer of any lot notice in writing that in his view the lot is a deliberate forgery and within fourteen days after such notification the buyer returns the same to the Auctioneer in the same condition as at the time of the sale and satisfies the Auctioneer that considered in the light of the entry in the catalogue the lot is a deliberate forgery then the sale of the lot will be rescinded and the purchase price of the same refunded. "A deliberate forgery" means a lot made with intention to deceive.
 - (b) A buyer's claim under this condition shall be limited to any amount paid to the Auctioneer for the lot and for the purpose of this condition the buyer shall be the person to whom the original invoice was made out by the Auctioneer.
- 9. Lots may be removed during the sale after full settlement in accordance with 4(d) hereof.
- 10. All goods delivered to the Auctioneer's premises will be deemed to be delivered for sale by auction unless otherwise stated in writing and will be catalogued and sold at the Auctioneer's discretion and accepted by the Auctioneer subject to all these conditions. In the case of miscellaneous books, the Auctioneer reserves the right to extract and dispose of books that, in the opinion of the Auctioneer at his absolute discretion, have no saleable value and, therefore, might detract from the saleability of the rest of the lot and the Auctioneer shall incur no liability to the seller, in respect of the books disposed of. By delivering the goods to the Auctioneer for inclusion in his auction sales each seller acknowledges that he/she accepts and agrees to all the conditions.
- 11. (a) Unless otherwise instructed in writing all goods on the Auctioneer's premises and in their custody will be held insured against the risks of fire, burglary, water damage and accidental breakage or damage. The value of the goods so covered will be the hammer price, or in the case of unsold lots the lower estimate, or in the case of loss or damage prior to the sale that which the specialised staff of the Auctioneer shall in their absolute discretion estimate to be the auction value of such goods.
 - (b) The Auctioneer shall not be responsible for damage to or the loss, theft, or destruction of any goods not so insured because of the owner's written instructions.
















