An account of the first successful Niger expedition of 1854, funded by the Liverpool entrepreneur Macgregor Laird, aimed at opening up West Africa to trade by steamships able to navigate the key rivers into the interior. A scottish naval surgeon and naturalist, William Balfour Baikie (1825-1864) took command of the expedition after the death of the ship's captain, and was the first to successfully trial the use of quinine on board; not one of the Europeans on board the Pleiad died of fever. The success of the expedition led to the formation of the Dutch East India Company. Mauritius was named as such during the expedition, and is pictured in the first plate of the work.

The first edition of this atlas was published in separate parts - thus the first and second volumes have their own title pages and dates. The first volume deals with the historical development of cosmography, geology, astronomy, oceanography and winds, and illustrates this with a series of plates of globes, spheres, continents and astronomical systems. The second volume is dedicated to historical geography and mapping, having 84 maps and illustrative plates. The next volume to be published covered contemporary geography, but this is not present here. Desnos announced a final volume but this was never published.

Jacques Barrelier was a French Dominican doctor who collected plants throughout southern Europe. Published after Barrelier's untimely death in 1673 and the destruction of the original manuscript in a fire. The plates were discovered by Antoine de Jussieu (Professor of Botany at the Jardin des Plantes) who saw it through publication with his own accompanying text. (1)

The first work extremely rare, if not unique: only one other (incomplete) copy of this edition of Furber's flower plates offered for sale at auction (Jeschske van Vliet, 15 April 2010, lot 243). This edition is a new version by John Bowles of Furber's Twelve Months of Flowers, after designs by Peter Casteels, first published in London in 1730. The plates are slightly smaller, in reverse, and have an engraved border.
Furber was a nurseryman with gardens near Hyde Park Gate, in Kensington, and a churchwarden at St. Mary Abbot's, Kensington for many years. The Twelve Months of Flowers were originally issued as a luxurious catalogue for his stock: over 400 flowers are illustrated, and each is identified in the key below the picture, so that customers could easily order their requirements. Furber employed artists Pieter Casteels and Henry Fletcher to create the depictions of flowers. The work was reprinted several times in the eighteenth century, with later editions coloured (as here), partly to obscure the catalogue's original intention while at the same time enhancing the decorative appeal of the plates.
Wilkes' Twelve New Designs of English Butterflies, dedicated according to the title to 'the Worthy Members of the Aurelian Society...' is also scarce. "It is unlikely that this work was distributed bound as a volume, but the plates were probably set out on Wilkes's stall for sale either singly or in sets of twelve" (Lisney).

When the Ordnance Survey decided to publish its maps itself, rather than having them published by a separate commercial business, it started to print its newly mapped sheets as they were surveyed and engraved. This was the original 1-inch 'Old Series' which would eventually cover the whole country. The socalled 'Mudge' map of Kent was published as a county map by William Faden in 1801. After that, the county format was abandoned in favour of a complete map of the area surveyed, irrespective of county boundaries. From then on the sheets were published as soon as they were ready, starting with four sheets covering Essex (all dated 1805). From then on, as the maps carried the date of publication e.g. `Published April 18 th 1805 by Lt.Col.Mudge, Tower. This collection is of the consecutive nine sheets of the South-East of the country which represent 9 of the first 11 sheets of the Old Series published. Thus, the publication dates vary, sheet 11805 , sheet 21805 , sheet 31819 , sheet 41816 , sheet 51813 , sheet 61819 , sheet 71822 , sheet 81816 and sheet 91813 .

A large and detailed folding map, published during the Peninsular War. Probably because of the war, Nantiat is most exercised with the borders between Spain and Portugal, especially the passes through which it was expected that Napoleon's army might come when the campaign season started in the spring. It is probable that Faden saw an opportunity to sell this detailed and large-scale map to officers in Wellington's army in Portugal, with the idea that it could be used as a reference for the campaign. In July of 1810 - six months after the publication of the map the French military commander, Marshal Masséna led an army of 65,000 troops into Portugal, pushing on towards Lisbon, but was held back by the Lines of Torres Vedras a set of earthworks that had been built on the orders of Wellington. The campaign - significant for the emergence of large-scale guerrilla warfare - was eventually won by the British under the command of Lt. Gen. Sir Arthur Wellesley, later the 1st Duke of Wellington. It could be argued that the French defeat was sealed when Napoleon set out with a massive army on what proved to be the disastrous French invasion of Russia. This seriously depleted the French forces with the result that a combined allied army under Wellesley pushed into Spain, defeating the French at Salamanca and taking Madrid. In the following year, Wellington scored a decisive victory over King Joseph Bonaparte's army in the Battle of Vitoria. Pursued by the armies of Britain, Spain and Portugal, Marshal Jean-de-Dieu Soult, no longer able to get sufficient support from a depleted France, led the exhausted and demoralized French forces in a fighting withdrawal across the Pyrenees during the winter of 1813/1814. France, Napoleon and its European dominance would finally fall the following year at the battle of Waterloo.

The three works brought together here in one volume are part of the remarkable collection of prints known as the 'Cabinet du Roy', published in the second half of the 17th century at the behest of the French king 'afin d'encourager l'art de la gravure et d'en continuer l'histoire'.
The first part with plates by Silvestre is the first major description of the festivities held during the reign of Louis XIV, the Sun King (in May 1664). More than six hundred guests attended the parades, equestrian battles, theatre (with music and ballet, including performances of Moliere's La Princesse d'Alide and the first performances of Tartuffe and Georges Dandin) and fireworks, to celebrate the improvements made at Versailles since 1661, entitled 'The Pleasures of the Enchanted Island'. The title was inspired by an episode from Ariosto's Orlando Furioso, where the sorceress Alcina holds Ruggiero and his knights on her enchanted island; to keep themselves amused, the captives take part in tilting at the ring and attended a play and a ballet. The scenery was designed by Charles Vigerani, and the description of events written by Charles Perrault. The second part describes the spectacle held on 18 July 1668, to celebrate the Treaty of Aix-la-Chapelle, which marked the successful conclusion of the War of Devolution against Holland (1667-1668). The event also honoured Louis XIV's new favourite, Madame de Monstespan. The third part describes the six days of festivities between 4 July and 31 August 1674, in celebration of the reconquest of the Franche-Comté, and included Lully's opera Alceste, a concert in the Trianon garden, Moliere's Le Malade Imaginaire, a banquet, fireworks, and illumination around the Grand Canal.

An historian and art dealer, Hancarville (1719-1805) acted on behalf of the collector Sir William Hamilton (ambassador at Naples from 1764 to 1800), in his search for antique works of art, introducing him to the Porcinari family, whose collection of antiquities he purchased in 1766, and later sold to the British Museum. Hancarville also produced a fine illustrated catalogue of Hamilton's own collection in four folio volumes, entitled Antiquités étrusques, grecques et romaines, first published in Naples by Morelli in 1766 and 1767, and later reissued in five quarto volumes between 1785 and 1788. This actual pack was exhibited in 1875 by the Royal Archaeological Institute, as part of the temporary 'museum' set up for their annual meeting held at Canterbury. According to the accompanying correspondence, the Chapter Clerk of Canterbury at that time was a 'lineal descendant of Sir Godfrey whose murder is depicted on the cards'.

Rare. Although it is logical to assume these cards were produced soon after the events portrayed (hence they are often dated circa 1689) the British Museum gives them a slightly later date of circa 1700-1725. The lack of a tax stamp would indicate that they were either sold before 1711, or exported (or possibly finished between June 1711 and August 1712): see John Berry Taxation on Playing-Cards in England from 1711 to 1960 (IPCS Papers no.3, January 2001), p. 23.
The designs on these anti-Catholic propaganda cards, originally titled `Orange Cards' but usually titled as above, or alternatively 'Rebellion' or 'Reign of James II', are generally attributed to Francis Barlow. However, although he did design several similar packs, there is no firm evidence to show that these are also his. The British Museum has a volume of original playing card designs by Francis Barlow, none of which are represented in this pack. Nevertheless, Willshire describes these card designs as being in general good, as is also their technical execution. The Arabic numerals enable the story to be followed in chronological order, with scenes varying from macabre, such as 'The Midwife cutting her Husband to Pieces', to satirical, for example 'A Priest selling of Relicks by Auction' in which the relics are 'Tho[mas] à Becket's Old Stockins'.
There were numerous similar packs produced around this time, each emphasising various aspects of the events leading up to the reign of William of Orange. Sylvia Mann, in Collecting Playing Cards (pp. 151 \& following) describes several English political propaganda decks, including this one which she calls 'The Revolution'.

Jonathan Goodall actually became a partner in the firm in around 1840. The Goodall court cards were redesigned to appear more naturalistic in around 1845, with various minor design adjustments over the next 5 years. ## JANE AUSTEN 1775-1817: THE DAVID GILSON \& CHRIS VIVEASH COLLECTION

David Gilson (1936-2014) is a familiar name to all Jane Austen collectors thanks to his indispensable and unsurpassed Bibliography of Jane Austen. Originally published by Oxford University Press in 1982 it is far more exhaustive than Sir Geoffrey Keynes's fine bibliography published by Nonesuch Press in 1929. David had been the Taylor Institution librarian in Oxford from 1961 to 1995 but his lifelong passion was Jane Austen. With his partner Chris Viveash they were familiar and friendly faces at book auctions, in second-hand bookshops and at book fairs across the country over many decades. David's primary collection of Jane Austen books was given to King's College, Cambridge, in the late 1980s, and was augmented by the collection of his friend Dorothy Warren. David and Chris's collecting interest in Austen did not end with that bequest and this secondary, but nonetheless highly impressive collection, was built up from the 1990s into the early part of this century.

## AFTER THE AUCTION

Please note successful bids made via live bidding cannot be invoiced or paid for until the day after an auction. A live bidding fee of $3 \%$ + VAT (Dominic Winter / Invaluable) or $4.95 \%$ + VAT (the-saleroom) will be added to your invoice.

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Cash: Payments can be made at the Cashier's Office, either during or after the sale.
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Bank Transfer: All transfers must state the relevant invoice number. If transferring from a foreign currency, the amount we receive must be the total due after the currency conversion and the deduction of any bank charges.

Note to Overseas Clients: All payments must be made by bank transfer only. No card payments will be accepted unless by special prior arrangements with the auctioneers.
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Successful commission or live bids will be invoiced to you the day after the sale. When it is possible for our in-house packing department to send your purchase(s), a charge for postage/packing/insurance will be included in your invoice. 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## ARTIST'S RESALE RIGHT LAW ("DROIT DE SUITE")

Lots marked with AR next to the lot number may be subject to Droit de Suite.
Droit de Suite is payable on the hammer price of any artwork sold in the lifetime of the artist, or within 70 years of the artist's death. The buyer agrees to pay Dominic Winter Auctioneers Ltd. an amount equal to the resale royalty and we will pay such amount to the artist's collecting agent. Resale royalty applies where the Hammer price is 1,000 Euros or more and the amount cannot be more than 12,500 Euros per lot.

The amount is calculated as follows:
Royalty For the Portion of the Hammer Price (in Euros)
4.00\% up to 50,000
$3.00 \%$ between $50,000.01$ and 200,000
$1.00 \%$ between 200,000.01 and 350,000
$0.50 \%$ between $350,000.01$ and 500,000
Invoices will, as usual, be issued in Pounds Sterling. For the purposes of calculating the resale royalty the Pounds Sterling/Euro rate of exchange will be the European Central Bank reference rate on the day of the sale.

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1. The Seller warrants to the Auctioneer and the buyer that he is the true owner or is properly authorised to sell the property by the true owner and is able to transfer good and marketable title to the property free from any third party claims.
2. (a) The highest bidder to be the buyer. If during the auction the Auctioneer considers that a dispute has arisen he has absolute authority to settle it or re-offer the lot. The Auctioneer may at his sole discretion determine the advance of bidding or refuse a bid, divide any lot, combine any two or more lots or withdraw any lot without prior notice.
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4. (a) The buyer shall forthwith upon the purchase give in his name and permanent address and pay to the Auctioneer immediately after the conclusion of the auction the total sum due.
(b) The buyer may be required to pay down during the course of the sale the whole or any part of the total sum due, and if he fails to do so after such request the lot or lots may at the Auctioneer's absolute discretion be put up again and resold immediately.
(c) The buyer shall at his own expense take away any lot or lots purchased no later than five working days after the auction day.
(d) The Auctioneer may at his own discretion agree credit terms with a buyer and extend the time limits for collection in special cases but otherwise payment shall be deemed to have been made only after the Auctioneer has received cash or a sterling banker's draft or the buyer's cheque has been cleared.
5. (a) If the buyer fails to pay for or take away any lot or lots pursuant to clause 4 or breaches any other condition of that clause the Auctioneer as agent for the seller shall be entitled after consultation with the seller to exercise one or other of the following rights:
(i) Rescind the sale of that or any other lots sold to the buyer who defaults and re-sell the lot or lots whereupon the defaulting buyer shall pay to the Auctioneer any shortfall between the proceeds of that sale after deduction of costs of re-sale and the total sum due. Any surplus shall belong to the seller.
(ii) Proceed for damages for breach of contract.
(b) Without prejudice to the Auctioneer's rights hereunder if any lots or lots are not collected within five days or such longer period as the Auctioneer may have agreed otherwise, the Auctioneer may charge the buyer a storage charge of $£ 1.00$ + VAT at the current rate per lot per day.
(c) Ownership of the lot purchased shall not pass to the buyer until he has paid to the Auctioneer the total sum due.
6. (a) The seller shall be entitled to place a reserve on any lot and the Auctioneer shall have the right to bid on behalf of the seller for any lot on which a reserve has been placed. A seller may not bid on any lot on which a reserve has been placed.

No warranty whatsoever is given by the Auctioneer or the seller in respect of any lot and any express or implied warranties are hereby excluded.
8. (a) Notwithstanding any other terms of these conditions, if within fourteen days of the sale the Auctioneer has received from the buyer of any lot notice in writing that in his view the lot is a deliberate forgery and within fourteen days after such notification the buyer returns the same to the Auctioneer in the same condition as at the time of the sale and satisfies the Auctioneer that considered in the light of the entry in the catalogue the lot is a deliberate forgery then the sale of the lot will be rescinded and the purchase price of the same refunded. "A deliberate forgery" means a lot made with intention to deceive.
(b) A buyer's claim under this condition shall be limited to any amount paid to the Auctioneer for the lot and for the purpose of this condition the buyer shall be the person to whom the original invoice was made out by the Auctioneer.
9. Lots may be removed during the sale after full settlement in accordance with 4(d) hereof.
10. 11. (a) Unless otherwise instructed in writing all goods on the Auctioneer's premises and in their custody will be held insured against the risks of fire, burglary, water damage and accidental breakage or damage.
