an average elevation of 19000 feet, despite being deserted by their guides. their food supplies giving out and almost all their transport animals dying. The Indian sub-surveyor Atma Ram accompanied Bower and Thorold and made an important map of the which region is reproduced in the book. Bower was the first European to cross the Tibetan plateau, for which he was awarded the Founder's Medal of the Royal Geographical Society.







Dr. Livingstone, the publishers have to acknowledge their obligations to the spirited conductors of the British Banner, in whose columns, in detached portions, this remarkable history first appeared' (Preface)





The uniform resembles similarly styled types of clothing used by military academies in early nineteenth century France. Speculatively, the present portrait might possibly represent one of the sons of the famed Haitian revolutionary leader, Toussaint L'Ouverture (1743-1803), who died in a French prison at the age of 59. His two sons, Isaac (born 1784) and Saint-Jean (born 1791) were sent to a school for sons of colonial officials in France around 1796, but repeatedly ran away so eventually were sent to the College de la Marche, part of the University of Paris, where they were taken up by Josephine Beauharnais around 1798 after Toussaint had intervened to rehabilatate the future Empress's sugar estates in Saint Domingo, following their decline following the French Revolution. 

Barclay, Perkins & Co Brewhouse began as Anchor Brewery in Southwark, established by James Monger the Elder in 1616, next to the site where the original Globe Theatre stood. It was successively owned by James Child, Edmund Halsey, Ralph Thrale and then his son Henry Thrale (1758-1781). Thrale, with his wife Hester Lynch Piozzi, both friends of Dr Samuel Johnson (who had his own room at the Brewhouse and wrote many of his famous works there), continued to expand the business. Johnson initially wished Mrs Thrale to keep the Brewhouse after her husband died in 1781 but it was sold to the Barclay family. The Barclays took Henry Thrale's manager, John Perkins, into partnership with a quarter share of the profits. The business continued to flourish and by 1810 with production at over 200,000 barrels a year. It became the biggest brewery in the world and attracted some famous individuals including the Prince of Wales, the German statesman Otto von Bismarck, Prince Louis-Napoléon Bonaparte, Ibrahim Pasha of Egypt, Giuseppe Garibaldi and the Austrian general Julius Jacob von Haynau. 



The group tries in vain to reach St. Peter, who stands beside a door opened to "Popish Supremacy."

Seated next to the Duke is the somnolent figure of Stadholder, the Prince of Orange, and opposite him, seated on the barrel of a cannon, is an Austrian officer guzzling wine from a bottle. The implication is that the Duke and his entourage were not suffering from privation or hardship 'in the field', but instead, were carousing and enjoying themselves, rather than prosecuting a serious military campaign. 

Instead of staunching the wound, Dundas offers Pitt a glass of port - one of Pitt's well-known weaknesses - and in the place of the Mohawk Indian of West's original sits a near-naked Baron Loughborough, the Lord Chancellor, with the purse of the Great Seal and a monstrous wig of office replacing the Mohawk's beaded bag and headdress. 



De Excidio et Conquestu Britanniae (On the Ruin and Conquest of Britain) is a sermon in three parts condemning the acts of Gildas' contemporaries, both secular and religious, whom he blames for the dire state of affairs in sub-Roman Britain. It is one of the most important sources for the history of Britain in the 5th and 6th centuries, as it is the only significant source for the period written by a near contemporary of the people and events described. Part I contains a narrative of British history from the Roman conquest to Gildas' time; it includes references to Ambrosius Aurelianus and the Britons' victory against the Saxons at the Battle of Mons Badonicus. Part II is a condemnation of five kings for their various sins, including relatively well-documented ones such as Maelgwn Gwynedd. Part III is an attack upon the British clergy of the age.







The first edition of this important work regards the history of the invention of the steam engine. The first book deals with moving forces, the second with grottos and fountains for palaces and gardens, and the third with the construction of organs. Salomon de Caus was a French Huguenot hydraulic engineer and architect under Louis XIII. He is known to have visited Italy in about 1595, where he saw the famous Mannerist garden at Pratolino, which stimulated his interest in water features. He later designed the garden of Somerset House and a garden now on the site occupied by the Maritime Museum in Greenwich. His Hortus Palatinus for Princess Elizabeth and Frederick V was dubbed "the eighth wonder of the world" by some of his contemporaries.

Jérôme Bignon (1589-1656) was an author, celebrated magistrate and chief librarian of the French Royal Library. Bignon's grand-daughter Marie-Anne Françoise Bignon married François-Michel de Verthamon, Marquis de Bréau (1657-1738) in 1678. François-Michel de Verthamon was an advisor to the King Louis XIV in Parliament, elected first president of the Grand Council in 1697, and then Registrar Commander of the King's Orders in 1716. He was a great bibliophile who started the socalled Grand Council library, either by giving his own books, or by bequeathing a fund to increase it. The library was burned during the Palace fire in the mid-18th century. (1)

Edward Harley (1689-1741), son of Robert, 1st Earl of Oxford and Mortimer, married the only daughter and heir of the 1st Duke of Newcastle upon Tyne, who brought a fortune of half a million pounds. Not surprisingly, he collected on a grand scale so that at his death he was estimated to own 7,639 manuscript volumes, 14,236 original rolls, charters and deeds, 330,000 printed pamphlets, 41,000 prints, over 17,000 books (the finest private library in England at the time), as well as antiquities, coins, medals and pictures. The Harley Manuscripts were sold to the nation in 1753 for £10,000 (a fraction of their contemporary value) under the Act of Parliament that also established the British Museum.

Daniel Daulby (1745/6-1798), a Liverpool brewer and collector of prints and drawings, was celebrated in his own lifetime as perhaps the greatest British collector of Rembrandt etchings, of which he published a catalogue: A Descriptive catalogue of the works of Rembrandt, and of his scholars Bol, Livens and van Vriet, compiled from the original etchings and from the catalogues of de Burgy, Gersaint, Helle and Glomy, Marcus and Yver (1796). Daulby was the brother-in-law of the historian, poet, art collector, lawyer, politician and philanthropist, William Roscoe. His posthumous sales took place at Thomas Vernon's, Liverpool on 12 August 1799 and eight following days; his prints were sold at Christie's on 14 May and three following days.

PREFACE TO NEW EDITION.

I HAVE been lately so often asked by friends on whose judgment I can rely, to permit the publication of another edition of " Modern Painters in its original form, that I have at last yielded, though with some violence to my own feelings; for many parts of the first and second volumes are written in a narrow enthusiasm, and the substance of their metaphysical and religious speculation is only justifiable on the ground of its absolute honesty. Of the third, fourth, and fifth volumes I indeed mean eventually to rearrange what I think of permanent interest, for the complete edition of my works, but with fewer and less elaborate illustrations : nor have I any serious grounds for refusing to allow the book once more to appear in the irregular form which it took as it was written, since of the art-teaching and landscape description it contains I have little to retrench, and nothing to retract.


This final edition must, however, be limited to a thousand copies, for some of the more delicate plates are already worn, that of the Mill Stream in the fifth volume, and of the Loire Side very injuriously; while that of the Shores of Wharfe had to be retouched by an engraver after the removal of the mezzotint for reprinting. But Mr. Armytage's, Mr. Cousen's, and Mr. Cuff's magnificent plates are still in good state ; and my own etchings, though injured, are still good enough to answer their purpose.

I sign with my own hand this preface to every copy, thus certifying it as containing the best impressions of the original plates now produceable; and belonging to the last edition of the book in its complete form.

Scarce suffrage cookbook, published by the National Union of Women's Suffrage Societies (NUWSS) to raise money for the cause. The British Library gives the date as approximately 1912, but the book was announced in an issue of the periodical 'The Common Cause' on 18th November, 1909. There are two different cover designs for the work, one with two children standing below an apple tree, and ours, depicting three women and a small child. It is not known which variant was the first, but ours appears to be the rarer of the two and, with its depiction of three strong women, more appropriate.

The book contains a wide variety of culinary, household, and medical receipts, for example: 'Brains (For Invalids), Mrs. Julian Osler, Edgbaston; 'Llanberis Pudding', Mrs. W. Ryland, Edgbaston; 'Method of washing Handkerchiefs when travelling', Mrs. Vincent, Camberley; 'Chicken stuffed with Saccotosh', Miss Otter, Chelsea; 'Soubise Soup', Miss Dorothea M. Goldring, Claygate; 'To make Basins and Pans Fireproof', Mrs. Gayton, Merstham; 'Fairyland Pudding', Mrs. Buckley, Edgbaston. Two further recipes at the end are entitled 'Menus for Meals for Suffrage Workers' and 'Recipe for Cooking and Preserving a Good Suffrage Speaker', contributed by Mrs. Bertrand Russell, Bagley Wood, the latter with such amusing instructions as 'First: Butter the speaker, when asking her to come, with a stamped addressed envelope, post-card, or telegraph form for a reply ... Fifth: Do not let her cool too rapidly after the meeting, but place her considerately by a nice bedroom fire, with a light supper to be taken in solitude ...'. (1)

AFTER THE AUCTION

Online Results: If you weren't present or able to follow the auction live, you can find results for the sale on our website shortly after the sale has ended.

Payment: The price you pay is the amount at which the auctioneer's hammer falls (the hammer price), plus a buyer's premium (a percentage of the final hammer price) and vat where applicable. You will be issued with an invoice made out to the name and address provided on your registration form.

Please note successful bids made via live bidding cannot be invoiced or paid for until the day after an auction. A live bidding fee of 3% + VAT (Dominic Winter / Invaluable) or 4.95% + VAT (the-saleroom) will be added to your invoice.

METHODS OF PAYMENT

Cheque: Cheques will only be accepted on the day of the sale by prior arrangement (please contact our office for further information). Cheques by post will be accepted but a period of 5 working days will be required for the cheque to clear before purchases can be collected or posted.

Cash: Payments can be made at the Cashier's Office, either during or after the sale.

Debit Card: There is no additional charge for purchases made with debit cards in the UK.

Credit Cards: We accept Visa and Mastercard. It is advisable to let your card provider know in advance if you are intending to purchase. This reduces the time needed to obtain authorisation when the payment is made.

Bank Transfer: All transfers must state the relevant invoice number. If transferring from a foreign currency, the amount we receive must be the total due after the currency conversion and the deduction of any bank charges.

Note to Overseas Clients: All payments must be made by bank transfer only. No card payments will be accepted unless by special prior arrangements with the auctioneers.

Collection/Postage/Delivery: If you attend the auction in person and are successful in your bid, you are free to collect your item once payment has been made.

Successful commission or live bids will be invoiced to you the day after the sale. When it is possible for our in-house packing department to send your purchase(s), a charge for postage/packing/insurance will be included in your invoice. Where it is not possible for our in-house packing department to send your item you will be required to make your own arrangements or to contact Mailboxes etc (tel: 01793 525009) or Pack and Send (tel: 01635 887237) who may be able to help.

We provide a monthly delivery service to Central London, usually on Wednesday of the week following an auction. Payment must be received before this option can be requested. A charge will be added to your invoice for this service.

ARTIST'S RESALE RIGHT LAW ("DROIT DE SUITE")

Lots marked with **AR** next to the lot number may be subject to Droit de Suite.

Droit de Suite is payable on the hammer price of any artwork sold in the lifetime of the artist, or within 70 years of the artist's death. The buyer agrees to pay Dominic Winter Auctioneers Ltd. an amount equal to the resale royalty and we will pay such amount to the artist's collecting agent. Resale royalty applies where the Hammer price is £1,000 or more and the amount cannot be more than £12,500 per lot.

The amount is calculated as follows:

Royalty For the Portion of the Hammer Price (in GBP)

- 4.00% up to 50,000
- 3.00% between 50,000.01 and 200,000
- 1.00% between 200,000.01 and 350,000
- 0.50% between 350,000.01 and 500,000


CONDITIONS OF SALE AND BUSINESS

- The Seller warrants to the Auctioneer and the buyer that he is the true owner or is properly authorised to sell the property by the true owner and is able to transfer good and marketable title to the property free from any third party claims.
- (a) The highest bidder to be the buyer. If during the auction the Auctioneer considers that a dispute has arisen he has absolute authority to settle it or re-offer the lot. The Auctioneer may at his sole discretion determine the advance of bidding or refuse a bid, divide any lot, combine any two or more lots or withdraw any lot without prior notice.
 - (b) Where goods are bought at auction by a buyer who has entered into an agreement with another or others that the other or others (or some of them) shall abstain from bidding for the goods and the buyer or other party or one of the other parties is a dealer (as defined in the Auction Biddings Agreement Act 1927) the buyer warrants that the goods are bought bona fide on joint account.
- 3. The buyer shall pay the price at which a lot is knocked down by the Auctioneer to the buyer ("the hammer price") together with a premium of 20% of the hammer price. Where the lot is marked by an asterisk the premium will be subject to VAT at 20% which under the Auctioneer's Margin Scheme will form part of the buyer's premium on our invoice and will not be separately identified (the premium added to the hammer price will hereafter collectively be referred to as "the total sum due"). By making any bid the buyer acknowledges that his attention has been drawn to the fact that on the sale of any lot the Auctioneer will receive from the seller commission at its usual rates in addition to the said premium of 20% and assents to the Auctioneer receiving the said commission.
- (a) The buyer shall forthwith upon the purchase give in his name and permanent address and pay to the Auctioneer immediately after the conclusion of the auction the total sum due.
 - (b) The buyer may be required to pay down during the course of the sale the whole or any part of the total sum due, and if he fails to do so after such request the lot or lots may at the Auctioneer's absolute discretion be put up again and resold immediately.
 - (c) The buyer shall at his own expense take away any lot or lots purchased no later than five working days after the auction day.
 - (d) The Auctioneer may at his own discretion agree credit terms with a buyer and extend the time limits for collection in special cases but otherwise payment shall be deemed to have been made only after the Auctioneer has received cash or a sterling banker's draft or the buyer's cheque has been cleared.
- 5. (a) If the buyer fails to pay for or take away any lot or lots pursuant to clause 4 or breaches any other condition of that clause the Auctioneer as agent for the seller shall be entitled after consultation with the seller to exercise one or other of the following rights:
 - (i) Rescind the sale of that or any other lots sold to the buyer who defaults and re-sell the lot or lots whereupon the defaulting buyer shall pay to the Auctioneer any shortfall between the proceeds of that sale after deduction of costs of re-sale and the total sum due. Any surplus shall belong to the seller.
 - (ii) Proceed for damages for breach of contract.
 - (b) Without prejudice to the Auctioneer's rights hereunder if any lots or lots are not collected within five days or such longer period as the Auctioneer may have agreed otherwise, the Auctioneer may charge the buyer a storage charge of £1.00 + VAT at the current rate per lot per day.
 - (c) Ownership of the lot purchased shall not pass to the buyer until he has paid to the Auctioneer the total sum due.
- 6. (a) The seller shall be entitled to place a reserve on any lot and the Auctioneer shall have the right to bid on behalf of the seller for any lot on which a reserve has been placed. A seller may not bid on any lot on which a reserve has been placed.
 - (b) Where any lot fails to sell, the Auctioneer shall notify the seller accordingly. The seller shall make arrangements either to re-offer the lot for sale or to collect the lot and may be asked to pay a commission not exceeding 50% of the selling commission and any special expenses incurred in cataloguing the lot.
 - (c) If such arrangements are not made within seven days of the notification the Auctioneer is empowered to sell the lot by auction or by private treaty at not less than the reserve price and to receive from the seller the normal selling commission and special expenses.

- 7. Any representation or statement by the Auctioneer in any catalogue, brochure or advertisement of forthcoming sales as to authorship, attribution, genuineness, origin, date, age, provenance, condition or estimated selling price is a statement of opinion only. Every person interested should exercise and rely on his own judgement as to such matters and neither the Auctioneer nor his servants or agents are responsible for the correctness of such opinions. No warranty whatsoever is given by the Auctioneer or the seller in respect of any lot and any express or implied warranties are hereby excluded.
- 8. (a) Notwithstanding any other terms of these conditions, if within fourteen days of the sale the Auctioneer has received from the buyer of any lot notice in writing that in his view the lot is a deliberate forgery and within fourteen days after such notification the buyer returns the same to the Auctioneer in the same condition as at the time of the sale and satisfies the Auctioneer that considered in the light of the entry in the catalogue the lot is a deliberate forgery then the sale of the lot will be rescinded and the purchase price of the same refunded. "A deliberate forgery" means a lot made with intention to deceive.
 - (b) A buyer's claim under this condition shall be limited to any amount paid to the Auctioneer for the lot and for the purpose of this condition the buyer shall be the person to whom the original invoice was made out by the Auctioneer.
- 9. Lots may be removed during the sale after full settlement in accordance with 4(d) hereof.
- 10. All goods delivered to the Auctioneer's premises will be deemed to be delivered for sale by auction unless otherwise stated in writing and will be catalogued and sold at the Auctioneer's discretion and accepted by the Auctioneer subject to all these conditions. In the case of miscellaneous books, the Auctioneer reserves the right to extract and dispose of books that, in the opinion of the Auctioneer at his absolute discretion, have no saleable value and, therefore, might detract from the saleability of the rest of the lot and the Auctioneer shall incur no liability to the seller, in respect of the books disposed of. By delivering the goods to theAuctioneer for inclusion in his auction sales each seller acknowledges that he/she accepts and agrees to all the conditions.
- 11. (a) Unless otherwise instructed in writing all goods on the Auctioneer's premises and in their custody will be held insured against the risks of fire, burglary, water damage and accidental breakage or damage. The value of the goods so covered will be the hammer price, or in the case of unsold lots the lower estimate, or in the case of loss or damage prior to the sale that which the specialised staff of the Auctioneer shall in their absolute discretion estimate to be the auction value of such goods.
 - (b) The Auctioneer shall not be responsible for damage to or the loss, theft, or destruction of any goods not so insured because of the owner's written instructions.
- 12. The Auctioneer shall remit the proceeds of the sale to the seller thirty days after the day of the auction provided that the Auctioneer has received the total sum due from the buyer. In all other cases the Auctioneer will remit the proceeds of the sale to the seller within seven days of the receipt by the Auctioneer of the total sum due. The Auctioneer will not be deemed to have received the total sum due until after any cheque delivered by the buyer has been cleared. In the event of the Auctioneer exercising his right to rescind the sale his obligation to the seller hereunder lapses.
- 13. In the case of the seller withdrawing instructions to the Auctioneer to sell any lot or lots, the Auctioneer may charge a fee of 12.5% of the Auctioneer's middle estimate of the auction price of the lot withdrawn together with Value Added Tax thereon and any expenses incurred in respect of the lot or lots.
- 14. The Auctioneer's current standard notices and information (i.e. Collation and Amendments) will apply to any contract with the Auctioneer as if incorporated herein.
- 15. These conditions shall be governed by and construed in accordance with English Law.
