A collection of beautiful and exquisitely detailed watercolour studies of Chinese botanical specimens by Chinese artists, likely to have been produced in the workshops of the trading port of Canton or elsewhere, and destined for the European market. The watercolours, large in format and in good condition, include Glechoma Hederacea, Oriental Quince, White Camellia, Grevillea Petrophiloides, Sonchus Oleraceus, Asclepias Curassavica, Bauhinea Purpurea, Solidago Virgaurea, Caesalpina Pulcherrima, Combretum Indicum, Gardenia Radicans, Magnolia Liliflora, Impatiens Balsamina, Gossipium Barbadense, Lagerstroemia Indica, Lonicera, Jasminum Fruticans.



'Arundell was chaplain to the British factory at Smyrna from 1822–36. He travelled extensively and made collections of coins, manuscripts and antiquities. The present work is a description of the Anatolian plain, where Arundell, travelling in 1833, had identified a number of modern villages with an action and the stress; he covered over 1000 miles in Anatolia 'through districts the greater part of which had hitherto been undescribed by any European traveller' - DNB' (Blackmer).



'The determination of the British government to survey the approaches to ports laid open by the new treaty with China led to this expedition. Extensive accounts are given of Singapore, Borneo, Hong Kong, Macao, the Philippine Islands, Celebes, the Moluccas, Formosa, the Ryukyu Islands, Quelpert Island of Korea, and Japan' (Hill).



First work Hill 279; Howes C-299; Sabin 12004. Chappe d'Auteroche's race against time to reach Baja California in time to observe the transit of Venus in 1769, the author fatally contracting yellow fever two days after his observations.

Second work Ferguson 151; Hill 766; Sabin 30011. The only published contemporary account of Edward Edwards' expedition in HMS Pandora, by the ship's surgeon George Hamilton, to search for the mutineers from HMS Bounty. On arrival in Tahiti, fourteen mutineers who remained instead of following Fletcher Christian to Pitcairn Island were arrested. After sailing close to Pitcairn Island the ship was wrecked on the Great Barrier Reef, the captain, crew and surviving ten mutineers took to open boats, and after an epic 1100 mile journey reached Timor via the Torres Straits. The mutineers were returned to England thereafter, all were tried and three hanged.

Company School watercolours such as the present collection were made in the late 18th and first half of the 19th century for British (and European) consumption, by Indian artists working in an Indo-European style that appealed to employees of the East India Company and their families, typically depicting native Indian costume, street scenes and trade.

Charles D'Oyly's Costumes of India was issued with a lithographic title and 12 plates. Complete copies are rare, with only three located in institutional libraries (British Library, Yale University, and University of Melbourne). Not in Abbey, Colas, or Lipperheide.

A collection of original woodblocks attributed to Thomas Bewick, John Bewick, and other artists including the Bewick Workshop, formerly in the collection of Mabel Anne Rooth (1859-1954), daughter of Goodwin Rooth and Augusta Ann Smith. By 1911, Mabel was living in Camden Town as a lady 'of private means', according to the census of that year. The collection has remained in the family until now. Many of the blocks were thought to have been owned by Bewick's daughters, Jane Bewick (1787-1881) or Isabella Bewick (1790-1883), and were purchased at the periodic auction sales of Bewick's woodblocks, books, engravings and artefacts which took place in the late 19th and early 20th century. This is the third and final section of the collection.

This single-sheet map was published during the same period as Smith's "Geological Survey Atlas of England," a series of 24 slightly smaller county maps coloured to show geological strata, issued in parts of 3 maps each from 1819 through 1824. Smith may have planned to sell the general map of England along with the completed series, which, however, remained unfinished.

Smith developed the idea that the strata in the Earth's crust belonged in a single common sequence - Cambrian, Ordovician, Silurian, Devonian and so on - and that this sequence reflected the temporal order in which the rocks had been laid down. It was Smith who first planned and documented the association between fossils and rock-dating, thus making palaeontology a fundamental part of geology. As Printing and the Mind of Man states 'It was now beginning to emerge that geological time could no longer tolerate the shackles of biblical chronology. It was in the testimony of the rocks and not in the Book of Genesis that the history of the earth must be sought'.



The map depicts Europe as a Virgin Queen, holding a crown, orb and sceptre, with Iberia forming her head and crown, Denmark her right arm, and Italy her left arm, with Sicily as her orb. Greece, the Balkans and Russia form her skirts, and Bohemia, positioned in the centre of her torso, is shown as a circular forest. It has been postulated that the character of the map is not a woman at all but a representation of Charles V of Spain, showing Europe with Spain as its crown. An uncommon cartographic oddity.

Phillis Wheatley Peters (c. 1753-1784) was an American author who is considered the first African-American author of a published book of poetry. She was kidnapped from her home in West Africa and subsequently sold into slavery at the age of seven or eight. She was bought by the Wheatley family of Boston who taught her to read and write, and encouraged her to write poetry when they witnessed her talent. In 1773, during a trip to London, Wheatley met several prominent people who became her patrons and facilitated the publication of her Poems on Various Subjects, Religious and Moral on 1 September 1773. The book was a great success and brought her transatlantic fame, including praise from George Washington and other prominent figures. Phillis was emancipated by the Wheatleys shortly after the publication of her book of poems. The first edition of this periodical volume was published in 1772 and included this previously unpublished poem by the 18-year-old poet. The Annual Register was a fitting place for its publication, the journal's editor being the Anglo-Irish statesman Edmund Burke, who opposed slavery and had proposed a bill to ban slave holders from sitting as members of parliament. The poem in this second edition of the Annual Register for 1772 was printed in 1775. The version here appears to be the unrevised version, as originally printed in 1772. For example, the second line, 'Your vent'rous Afric in the deep design' was later changed to 'Your vent'rous Afric in her great design'. £200 - £300





THE JAMES SHURMER EX-LIBRIS COLLECTION: PART III

James Shurmer (1944-2023) collected bookplates over many years, forming a large collection covering different styles, artists and history. His interest led to him becoming an active member of The Bookplate Society, for whom he served as a committee member, utilising his skills by designing The Bookplate Journal for a number of years. After training as a typographic designer at the London College of Printing in the 1960s, James worked at Lund Humphries before becoming the last house designer at the famous Curwen Press, where he was responsible for designing the last unicorn house style for the company. After the closure of the company in 1984, James became a freelance designer. He designed guide books for the National Trust for over 30 years as well as exhibition catalogues for a number of major institutions including the British Museum, British Library and National Portrait Gallery. His last completed design project was a three-volume catalogue of sculpture for the Ashmolean Museum, Oxford. During his career he won a number of awards including Designer of the Year from the Wynkyn de Worde Society and a National Book League award for London - 2000 years of a city and its people by Felix Parker and Peter Jackson.

AFTER THE AUCTION

Online Results: If you weren't present or able to follow the auction live, you can find results for the sale on our website shortly after the sale has ended.

Payment: The price you pay is the amount at which the auctioneer's hammer falls (the hammer price), plus a buyer's premium (a percentage of the final hammer price) and vat where applicable. You will be issued with an invoice made out to the name and address provided on your registration form.

Please note successful bids made via live bidding cannot be invoiced or paid for until the day after an auction. A live bidding fee of 3% + VAT (Dominic Winter / Invaluable) or 4.95% + VAT (the-saleroom) will be added to your invoice. Please note that as from January 2025 all successful Invaluable bids are now subject to a minimum charge of the UK equivalent of \$10 per lot.

METHODS OF PAYMENT

Cheque: Cheques will only be accepted on the day of the sale by prior arrangement (please contact our office for further information). Cheques by post will be accepted but a period of 5 working days will be required for the cheque to clear before purchases can be collected or posted.

Cash: Payments can be made at the Cashier's Office, either during or after the sale.

Debit Card: There is no additional charge for purchases made with debit cards in the UK.

Credit Cards: We accept Visa and Mastercard. It is advisable to let your card provider know in advance if you are intending to purchase. This reduces the time needed to obtain authorisation when the payment is made.

Bank Transfer: All transfers must state the relevant invoice number. If transferring from a foreign currency, the amount we receive must be the total due after the currency conversion and the deduction of any bank charges.

Note to Overseas Clients: All payments must be made by bank transfer only. No card payments will be accepted unless by special prior arrangements with the auctioneers.

Collection/Postage/Delivery: If you attend the auction in person and are successful in your bid, you are free to collect your item once payment has been made.

Shipping: Successful commission or live bids will be invoiced to you the day after the sale. When it is possible for our in-house packing department to send your purchase(s), a charge for postage/packing/insurance will be included in your invoice. Where it is not possible for our in-house packing department to send we will recommend other shipping specialists.

London Deliveries: We provide a monthly delivery service to Central London only, usually on Wednesday of the week following an auction. Payment must be received before this option can be requested. A charge will be added to your invoice for this service.

ARTIST'S RESALE RIGHT LAW ("DROIT DE SUITE")

Lots marked with AR next to the lot number may be subject to Droit de Suite.

Droit de Suite is payable on the hammer price of any artwork sold in the lifetime of the artist, or within 70 years of the artist's death. The buyer agrees to pay Dominic Winter Auctioneers Ltd an amount equal to the resale royalty and we will pay such amount to the artist's collecting agent. Resale royalty applies where the Hammer price is £1,000 or more.

The amount is calculated as follows:

Royalty For the Portion of the Hammer Price

4.00% up to £50,000

3.00% between £50,000.01 and £200,000

1.00% between £200,000.01 and £350,000

0.50% between £350,000.01 and £500,000


CONDITIONS OF SALE AND BUSINESS

- The Seller warrants to the Auctioneer and the buyer that he is the true owner or is properly authorised to sell the property by the true owner and is able to transfer good and marketable title to the property free from any third party claims.
- 2. (a) The highest bidder to be the buyer. If during the auction the Auctioneer considers that a dispute has arisen he has absolute authority to settle it or re-offer the lot. The Auctioneer may at his sole discretion determine the advance of bidding or refuse a bid, divide any lot, combine any two or more lots or withdraw any lot without prior notice.
 - (b) Where goods are bought at auction by a buyer who has entered into an agreement with another or others that the other or others (or some of them) shall abstain from bidding for the goods and the buyer or other party or one of the other parties is a dealer (as defined in the Auction Biddings Agreement Act 1927) the buyer warrants that the goods are bought bona fide on joint account.
- 3. The buyer shall pay the price at which a lot is knocked down by the Auctioneer to the buyer ("the hammer price") together with a premium of 22% of the hammer price. Where the lot is marked by an asterisk the premium will be subject to VAT at 20% which under the Auctioneer's Margin Scheme will form part of the buyer's premium on our invoice and will not be separately identified (the premium added to the hammer price will hereafter collectively be referred to as "the total sum due"). By making any bid the buyer acknowledges that his attention has been drawn to the fact that on the sale of any lot the Auctioneer will receive from the seller commission at its usual rates in addition to the said premium of 22% and assents to the Auctioneer receiving the said commission.
- 4. (a) The buyer shall forthwith upon the purchase give in his name and permanent address and pay to the Auctioneer immediately after the conclusion of the auction the total sum due.
 - (b) The buyer may be required to pay down during the course of the sale the whole or any part of the total sum due, and if he fails to do so after such request the lot or lots may at the Auctioneer's absolute discretion be put up again and resold immediately.
 - (c) The buyer shall at his own expense take away any lot or lots purchased no later than five working days after the auction day.
 - (d) The Auctioneer may at his own discretion agree credit terms with a buyer and extend the time limits for collection in special cases but otherwise payment shall be deemed to have been made only after the Auctioneer has received cash or a sterling banker's draft or the buyer's cheque has been cleared.
- 5. (a) If the buyer fails to pay for or take away any lot or lots pursuant to clause 4 or breaches any other condition of that clause the Auctioneer as agent for the seller shall be entitled after consultation with the seller to exercise one or other of the following rights:
 - (i) Rescind the sale of that or any other lots sold to the buyer who defaults and re-sell the lot or lots whereupon the defaulting buyer shall pay to the Auctioneer any shortfall between the proceeds of that sale after deduction of costs of re-sale and the total sum due. Any surplus shall belong to the seller.
 - (ii) Proceed for damages for breach of contract.
 - (b) Without prejudice to the Auctioneer's rights hereunder if any lots or lots are not collected within five days or such longer period as the Auctioneer may have agreed otherwise, the Auctioneer may charge the buyer a storage charge of £1.00 + VAT at the current rate per lot per day.
 - (c) Ownership of the lot purchased shall not pass to the buyer until he has paid to the Auctioneer the total sum due.
- 6. (a) The seller shall be entitled to place a reserve on any lot and the Auctioneer shall have the right to bid on behalf of the seller for any lot on which a reserve has been placed. A seller may not bid on any lot on which a reserve has been placed.
 - (b) Where any lot fails to sell, the Auctioneer shall notify the seller accordingly. The seller shall make arrangements either to re-offer the lot for sale or to collect the lot and may be asked to pay a commission not exceeding 50% of the selling commission and any special expenses incurred in cataloguing the lot.
 - (c) If such arrangements are not made within seven days of the notification the Auctioneer is empowered to sell the lot by auction or by private treaty at not less than the reserve price and to receive from the seller the normal selling commission and special expenses.

- 7. Any representation or statement by the Auctioneer in any catalogue, brochure or advertisement of forthcoming sales as to authorship, attribution, genuineness, origin, date, age, provenance, condition or estimated selling price is a statement of opinion only. Every person interested should exercise and rely on his own judgement as to such matters and neither the Auctioneer nor his servants or agents are responsible for the correctness of such opinions. No warranty whatsoever is given by the Auctioneer or the seller in respect of any lot and any express or implied warranties are hereby excluded.
- 8. (a) Notwithstanding any other terms of these conditions, if within fourteen days of the sale the Auctioneer has received from the buyer of any lot notice in writing that in his view the lot is a deliberate forgery and within fourteen days after such notification the buyer returns the same to the Auctioneer in the same condition as at the time of the sale and satisfies the Auctioneer that considered in the light of the entry in the catalogue the lot is a deliberate forgery then the sale of the lot will be rescinded and the purchase price of the same refunded.
 "A deliberate forgery" means a lot made with intention to deceive.
 - (b) A buyer's claim under this condition shall be limited to any amount paid to the Auctioneer for the lot and for the purpose of this condition the buyer shall be the person to whom the original invoice was made out by the Auctioneer.
- 9. Lots may be removed during the sale after full settlement in accordance with 4(d) hereof.
- 10. All goods delivered to the Auctioneer's premises will be deemed to be delivered for sale by auction unless otherwise stated in writing and will be catalogued and sold at the Auctioneer's discretion and accepted by the Auctioneer subject to all these conditions. In the case of miscellaneous books, the Auctioneer reserves the right to extract and dispose of books that, in the opinion of the Auctioneer at his absolute discretion, have no saleable value and, therefore, might detract from the saleability of the rest of the lot and the Auctioneer shall incur no liability to the seller, in respect of the books disposed of. By delivering the goods to the Auctioneer for inclusion in his auction sales each seller acknowledges that he/she accepts and agrees to all the conditions.
- 11. (a) Unless otherwise instructed in writing all goods on the Auctioneer's premises and in their custody will be held insured against the risks of fire, burglary, water damage and accidental breakage or damage. The value of the goods so covered will be the hammer price, or in the case of unsold lots the lower estimate, or in the case of loss or damage prior to the sale that which the specialised staff of the Auctioneer shall in their absolute discretion estimate to be the auction value of such goods.
 - (b) The Auctioneer shall not be responsible for damage to or the loss, theft, or destruction of any goods not so insured because of the owner's written instructions.
- 12. The Auctioneer shall remit the proceeds of the sale to the seller thirty days after the day of the auction provided that the Auctioneer has received the total sum due from the buyer. In all other cases the Auctioneer will remit the proceeds of the sale to the seller within seven days of the receipt by the Auctioneer of the total sum due. The Auctioneer will not be deemed to have received the total sum due until after any cheque delivered by the buyer has been cleared. In the event of the Auctioneer exercising his right to rescind the sale his obligation to the seller hereunder lapses.
- 13. In the case of the seller withdrawing instructions to the Auctioneer to sell any lot or lots, the Auctioneer may charge a fee of 12.5% of the Auctioneer's middle estimate of the auction price of the lot withdrawn together with Value Added Tax thereon and any expenses incurred in respect of the lot or lots.
