These include two large nonexistent lakes in the region of western Georgia and a non-existent mountain range extending from the Piedmonts across the North American continent. In South America, the archetypal cartographic myth, *Manoa o' El Dorado* (the golden city), is located on the northwestern shores of the *Lacus Parime vel Roponowini* in Guyana.



In the conclusion to a letter written to Arthur Helps a month later, (6 March 1870), Dickens says: 'In the accompanying box is a bundle of those choice little cigars duly dried in the summer heat of Gad's Hill. If you continue to like them and will impress upon Mr. Carlin that you confide in his supplying you as he supplies me, I think you will rarely get any worse' (The Letters of Charles Dickens: The Pilgrim Edition, Volume 12, 1868-1870, p. 500). Dickens died three months later, following a stroke at his Gads Hill Place home, on 9 June 1870.







Samuel Pegge 'the Elder' was an English antiquary and clergyman. Born at Chesterfield, Derbyshire, he was the son of Christopher Pegge and his wife Gertrude, daughter of Francis Stephenson of Unstone, near Chesterfield. Samuel published an important study on the Roman roads of Derbyshire as well as notes which his son, also Samuel, continued on the subject of Derbyshire words and phrases. Pegge became vicar of Godmersham, in Kent, in December 1731, and while living there he developed his antiquarian interests, collecting books and coins, corresponding with likeminded contemporaries, researching, and writing. He was elected a fellow of the Society of Antiquaries in 1751, 'To the classical and theological compositions of his youth, beginning in 1727 with the publication of a Latin ode on the death of King George I, he had added a body of predominantly antiquarian writings which increased substantially during his remaining forty-five years. Pegge was said to have been the most prolific of all contributors to the journal Archaeologia with more than fifty published articles and memoirs. His topics were as diverse as Anglo-Saxon jewels, the introduction of the vine into Britain, and the manner of King John's death, as well as more immediately local subjects such as bull-running at Tutbury in Staffordshire' (ODNB). Pegge's letters and papers are held in various regional archives, his collections relating to Kent at the Bodleian, Oxford.



Even though Muhammad Ali had long since renounced his birth name of Cassius Clay by the time of this fight, much of the media, as here, continued to use his 'slave' name. Billed as The Fight of the Century, this was an undisputed heavyweight championship boxing match between Joe Frazier and Muhammad Ali, that took place on at Madison Square Garden in New York City on 8 March 1971.

Frazier won in fifteen rounds by unanimous decision. In the final round, Frazier knocked Ali down with a vicious left hook, but Ali was back on his feet in three seconds. Nevertheless, Ali lost by unanimous decision, his first professional defeat. George Whiting's *London Evening Standard* report ran with the headline 'Aliops!'. This became the first of a trio of fights, the rematch events, both won by Ali, known as Super Fight II (1974) and the Thrilla in Manila (1975).

Frankenstein Playbills. Presumption! Or, The Fate of Frankenstein. Presumption, a two-act play by Richard Brinsley Peake, was the first dramatisation based on Mary Shelley's anonymous novel to be performed on stage. It opened on 28 July 1823 at the English Opera House [Lyceum Theatre, where Bram Stoker was later to work] on the Strand, London. Peake took some liberties in his adaptation, adding several new characters including the first of Victor Frankenstein's various assistants. Notably, he also turned Mary Shelley's well-cultured monster into a mute and rather idiotic creature. On the playbill his character's name is simply represented by a series of dashes. For this first season James Wallack took the part of Doctor Frankenstein and Thomas Potter Cooke the part of the monster.

Mary Shelley had mixed feelings about the play when it opened but, echoing Lord Byron, wrote: 'But lo and behold I found myself famous! Frankenstein had prodigious success as a drama and was about to be repeated for the twenty-third night at the English Royal Opera House'. Mary Shelley herself attended a performance on 29 August 1823. Whatever Mary Shelley's misgivings, having concluded 'the story is not well managed', the public were smitten and undeterred by controversy and protests against its attack on the Christian faith. Indeed, by 1826 there were said to have been about fifteen play versions based to some extent on Shelley's novel. First published anonymously in 1818, the second edition of Shelley's novel Frankenstein was issued on 11 August 1823, (the day before this 13th performance of Peake's play), this time printing Mary Shelley's name as the author. £300-500

Dame Eva Turner was an English dramatic soprano and one of the first British singers in the twentieth century to enjoy a prominent international career. She had a voice combining exceptional power and brilliance, which was ideally suited to the heaviest Wagnerian parts as well as the title role in Turandot, for which she became famous. She sang frequently at Covent Garden until 1948. In addition to the major Italian houses, she also appeared at Chicago, Vienna, Lisbon, Athens and Copenhagen. Her Aïda was given in the Pasadena Rose Bowl before an audience of 30,000.

Dame Eva had a life-long friendship with Gladys Parr, a mezzo-soprano singer who studied in London at the Royal Academy of Music. Gladys toured with Carl Rosa in 1915 and took numerous roles at Covent Garden including Siébel, Nicklausse, Frédéric, and Suzuki. She was quickly promoted to perform the leading roles of the mezzo repertoire. Later she worked with BNOC, Sadler's Wells and with the Covent Garden company, where she was heard during the international seasons as Magdalene, Annina in Der Rosenkavalier, and the Fortune Teller in Arabella. After the war she sung with the English Opera Group and worked with Benjamin Britten playing Florence Pike in Albert Herring (1947), Mrs Noah in Noye's Fludde (1958) and Mrs Baggott in The Little Sweep (1949). Britten wrote the role of Mrs Baggott especially for Gladys Parr and they maintained a friendship. She continued to correspond with Britten up until his death. Parr was very close with Emmanuel Hedmondt, the Canadian-born tenor. Family described them as inseparable sole mates, although they never married. £70-100
