First edition in Dutch, and the first illustrated with maps, of *Les empires*, *royaumes*, *estats* ... *et principautez du monde*, an influential compendium of geographical knowledge by French soldier and author Pierre d'Avity (1573-1635); the first edition of 1613, other preceding French editions, and the English translation of 1615 all had an engraved title-page only.

The 39 maps were originally published in the Caert-Thresoor, a sought-after miniature atlas first printed at Middleburg by Barent Langenes in 1598. According to Koeman, 'the Caert Thresoor ... [set] a new standard for minor atlases. The small maps are extremely well-engraved: neat and clear, elegantly composed'. Koeman implies that Cloppenburg, printer of the Wereld Spiegel, used the original plates of the 1598 edition, but he appears in fact to have used the re-engraved versions of Tabularum Geographicarum, a revision of the Carte-Thresoor by Petrus Bertius first published in 1600. The resulting maps cover most of the known world except for the Americas, and notably include Poland, Russia, Central Asia ('Tartary'), China, Japan, Burma, Persia, the Congo, and Mediterranean islands including Cyprus, Malta, Rhodes, Mallorca and Menorca, Sardinia, and the Canaries. There are also three separate maps of India, depicting the Bay of Bengal, southern India, and the Malabar Coast. A full list is available on request. (1) $f_{700} - f_{1000}$

Benyowsky was exiled to Siberia by the Russians, and led seventy prisoners on an escape mission out of Kamchatka, sailing to Japan, Formosa, and China. His memoir provides accounts of Siberia, the Russian fur trade, and the customs of Kamchatka. The escape party also allegedly reached the Alaskan mainland. (2)

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





A clean and fresh copy of Bordone's celebrated atlas of the world's islands, first published in 1528, and the second work of its kind, after Sonetti's Isolario of 1485. The double-page world map is one of the earliest known on oval projection.

The work also contains 'the first printed map specifically of North America' (Suarez, Shedding the Veil: Mapping the European Discovery of America, p. 66), 'the earliest known printed map of Japan' (Stjorms et al., eds., Mapping Asia, p. 137), a plan of 'Temistitan' (Mexico City) before its destruction by Cortes, and numerous maps of the Caribbean islands in addition to those of the Mediterranean. This second edition 'contains the notice of the conquest of Peru and the victory of Pizarro on March 5th, 1533, one year prior to the publication of the book' (Borba de Moraes). (1)



Original autograph manuscript of a rare account of Indian big-game hunting. The printed edition, issued privately at Secunderabad in 1884, is untraced in libraries, and two copies have appeared at auction, in 1974 and 2018; Czech cites the work from a reference in the Journal of the Bombay Natural History Society, but had not seen a copy. In each of these cases the author is listed simply as 'A. B. B'. The ownership inscription in our copy allows the author to be positively identified as Arthur Brooks Broadhurst (1860-1930) of the 14th (King's) Hussars. Broadhurst was born at Cheetham Hill, Lancashire and later lived at Penrith; his father was the industrialist Henry Tootal Broadhurst. He reached the rank of captain and was gazetted adjutant of auxiliary forces in 1888. For Broadhurst's personal fishing priest and binoculars (from the same source) see the following lot. (3)

'The artist who produced the costume drawings for this work appears to be unknown although the preface states "the subjects which compose this selection have been furnished at the liberality of a gentleman, who had stored his porfolio during his residence at Constantinople"' (Blackmer). It is possible that this gentleman was William Wittman, member of the British military mission which joined the Ottoman forces at Constantinople in 1799 with the aim of repelling Napoleon's invasion of Egypt and Syria. 

Della Chiesa (1595-1662) was Jesuit bishop of Saluzzo and 'one of the major Piedmontese historians of the seventeenth century' (Osborne, Dynasty and Diplomacy in the Court of Savoy, p. 76). Chapter 21 of the second volume (pp. 522-89) is dedicated to Cyprus.

'Linschoten was born in Haarlem, Holland, in 1563. In 1583 he sailed to India with Vicente da Fonseca, archbishop of Goa. He remained there until 1589, the year of his master's death, when he returned to Holland. Later, in 1594, he joined the expedition which, under the command of Nay, Brandt and Barentz, made discoveries in the China Sea. Linschoten died in Holland in 1633' (Borba de Moraes). His wide-ranging account is considered 'the real starting point of Dutch overseas expansion' (Helmers & Jannsen, eds., The Cambridge Companion to the Dutch Golden Age, p. 168).

This copy notably retains the two large folding plans of Goa and Angra by Jan van Doetechem after Linschoten, and the two folding views of St Helena. (The list of plates lists one plan of St Helena but the two present are evidently separate engravings.) The other folding plate is 'Forum seu praeconium Goae'. The extant maps are:



First published in French in 1703 as Le portulan de la partie de la mer Mediterrannee, ou Le vray guide des pilotes costiers; this Dutch translation was first printed at Leiden in 1745. One copy only of this edition in libraries worldwide, at the University of Amsterdam (their cataloguing supplying the date 1789), and four of the 1745 edition (Bayerische Staatsbibliothek, Bibliothèque nationale de France, Leiden, and the Royal Library of the Netherlands).

In addition to the charts, the 1745 edition is known to contain a folding plate (depicting an octant), a volvelle and a folding table. These are not found in the present copy, although the volvelle is mentioned in the instructions to the binder ('Berigt aan den boekebinder') on the final page. Furthermore, the catch-word 'Voor' on the verso of leaf [*3] ('Voorreden van de vertaalder') does not match the first word of the following page (p. 1), where the main text begins. In the 1745 edition the 'Voorreden van de vertaalder' leaf is instead signed *4; it is preceded by a dedication leaf to Jacob Philip, Baron van Botzelaer (1711-1781), itself signed *3, and followed by the 'Voorreden van de schryver', a four-leaf quire signed 2*. Notwithstanding these apparent defects our copy seems to conform to that held by the University of Amsterdam; it is conceivable that Keulens would have discarded the dedication leaf to the by then deceased Baron van Botzelaer, and reset the rest of the preliminaries as a result.

Conway Mordant Shipley (born in 1824) served onboard HMS Calypso on a cruise to the missionary stations in the South Sea Islands in 1848, having departed Valparaiso in February of that year. The work is dedicated to Vice Admiral Sir George F. Seymour, late Commander-in-Chief in the Pacific. The text contains a detailed description of the voyage, including the arrival at Pitcairn Island on the 9th of March, when a whale-boat was launched from the shore 'John Quintal was steersman and there were also Edward Quintal, Matthew Quintal, Fletcher Christian, John Adams, and many others with familiar names, in all twelve persons. Their forms were very robust, much sunburnt; dress, a shirt and trousers, though some few had coats; gentle-mannered and speaking English with great correctness, but with a Yankee accent.'. The author further chapters to the Society Islands, Samoa, or the Navigator Islands, and the Feejee or Viti Islands. A review of the work in The Spectator for 1st March 1851 states 'Lieutenant Shipley's sketches... present us with many picturesque combinations... the letterpress, narrative and descriptive... may be consulted with profit and amusement; especially the account of the small colony on Pitcairn's Island, descended from the mutineers of the Bounty'. 

Codrington arrived in the Crimea in September 1854 as major-general in command of the 1st brigade of the light division. His leadership was key to the allied victory at Alma, and his observations gave advance warning of the Russian attack at Inkerman. In September the following year he planned the allied assault on Sevastopol, and on 11 November replaced Sir James Simpson as commander-in-chief. 'He left the Peninsula on 12 July 1856, having received another parliamentary vote of thanks and been promoted lieutenant-general on 6 June 1856. Before he sailed, he also received the thanks of the Tartars of the Baidar valley for the protection given to them by the British troops' (ODNB). After returning to England he served as Liberal member of parliament for Greenwich and later as governor-general of Gibraltar, twice refusing the rank of field marshal.

Arguably the rarest and most important map of Pomerania. Created by Professor Eilhard Lubben under the instruction and patronage of Philip II. Duke of Pomerania, this monumental wall map illustrates and maps the country in extraordinary detail. Lubben surveyed the country in 1611 and 1612 and the map was eventually published in 1618. It is decorated with noble arms, a genealogical tree, portraits (including a prominent engraving of Philip II), and 46 town views. A few examples were presented to the Pomeranian court, but the shortage of paper and the thirty years war prevented the printing of additional examples and no extant copies of the 1618 printing are known.

Geelkerken's copperplates were re-discovered in the eighteenth century in Stralsund (a town featured in a vignette on the map), and in 1757 the map was reissued, but Scharfe notes that "again only a small number of copies were printed and so this edition is a very rare object today".

Lubben's map remained the only piece of significant cartography on Poland until the Prussian surveys of the 18th century and it remains as one of the finest examples of large scale surveying and mapping. Only a handful of copies are known and this particular example is in particularly fine condition. (1)

While the map bears the date of 1808, the map was in fact prepared between May 1808 and the Summer of 1811, such that by the time the last sheets were completed, Benedicti had died and Western Galicia was no longer a part of Austria. 



Kent, with Canterbury being the centre of the Church of England, Surrey and Middlesex bordering the capital, and Sussex with its maritime importance would all have warranted standing alone as individual maps. What persuaded Saxton to amalgamate these four counties into one map is something of a cartographic conundrum. (1)







A very good example of this scarce and important plan of warsaw by Pierre de Tirregaille. Pierre Ricaud de Tirregaille (1725-1770) was a French architect and engineer. Tirregaille came to Poland in 1752, where he worked as a civil architect, surveyor and as an army engineer and captain of an infantry regiment, eventually attaining the rank of lieutenant colonel in the Polish armed forces in 1762.

In 1758 and 1759, Tirregaille worked for the "Komisja Brukowa" or Cobblestone Commission. Created in 1685, the Cobblestone Commission was tasked with paving the streets of Warsaw and creating a modern sewer system. The Commission remained largely inactive until 1740, when it was headed by Crown Marshal Franciszek Bielinski. Under his leadership, over the next 20 years, the commission managed to pave 222 streets, a large majority of streets of the contemporary Polish capital. In 1757, Bielinski, with his own funds, created a the village of Bielino, which would become the modern city centre of Warsaw. In 1762, with his work nearly completed, Bielinski commissioned Tirregaille to prepare a detailed plan of the city of Warsaw, which resulted in the creation of the first map of Warsaw based upon a scientific survey. The view was embellished with vignettes of important buildings around the city, including, the Primate's Palace, the Symonowicz Palace, the palace of the Bishops of Cracow and the Radziwill Palace. Tirregaille's map is a monument to all of Bielinski's efforts in creating 'modern' Warsaw. (1)



James Howe (or How), also known as Howe of Skirling, was born in Skirling on the Scottish borders and apprenticed to a house painter, although his main interest was horses and cattle. A volume of engravings after his drawings was published in Edinburgh by W.H. Lizars in 1824, entitled Fourteen Engravings from Drawings of the Horse, itself a relative rarity (not present in Podeschi, Books on the Horse, Paul Mellon Collection, 1981), and a further series of prints entitled National Work depicting the breeds of horses in cattle in Scotland, was issued in three parts between 1829 and 1831 by Ballantyne & Company of Edinburgh. Howe became a firm friend of Sir Walter Scott, painting his portrait, as well as a farmyard scene incorporating Scott's legendary dog Camp at Ashestiel. A monograph on his life and work written by A.D. Cameron, published in 1986, is entitled The Man Who Loved to Draw Horses.

The present drawings conform closely in scale to the prints published in Howe's Fourteen Engravings from Drawings of the Horse.





The original execution record for George Joseph Smith, Maidstone Prison, 13 August 1915, a preprinted form from a Records of Execution ledger, completed in manuscript and giving details relating to the execution of George Joseph Smith for the Brides in the Bath Murders, with particulars of the condemned prisoner, and of the execution and records respecting the executioner (John Ellis, Rochdale) and his assistant (Edward Taylor, Brighton), plus opinion of the governor (F.E. Wintle) and medical officer (A. Hoar) 'as to the manner in which each of the above-named persons has performed his duty', one page, 33 x 41cm George Joseph Smith (1872-1915) was an English serial killer and bigamist. In 1915, he was convicted and subsequently hanged for the murder of three women, the case becoming known as the Brides in the Bath Murders. The case was widely reported in the media and had significance in the history of forensic pathology and detection. It was also one of the first cases in which similarities between connected crimes were used to prove deliberation, a technique used in subsequent prosecutions.

In this document Smith is registered as being forty-three years old, 5 feet 7 and a half inches, 161 pounds, of proportionate build and his neck being 'normal, thin, no scars'. The length of the determined drop before the execution was measured at 6 feet 8 inches, the drop as measured after the execution being 2 inches greater. The cause of death is noted as 'complete dislocation of vertebrae'. His neck after the execution is noted as 'bruised only, no abrasions'.



In total Armstrong and Aldrin spent 21 hours 31 minutes on the lunar surface at a site they named Tranquility Base before lifting off to rejoin Columbia in lunar orbit.

Provenance: From the estate of the American philosopher Rush Rhees (1905-1989). Rhees is principally known as a student, friend, and literary executor of Ludwig Wittgenstein, for whom he posthumously co-edited the Philosophical Investigations with G.E.M. Anscombe (1953).

In 1947 Wittgenstein gave up his Cambridge professorship, moved to Ireland and attempted to bring his Philosophical Investigations to completion. He left Ireland in 1949, was diagnosed with prostate cancer, and died in 1951. Wittgenstein completed his Tractatus Logico-Philosophicus in 1918, and it was first published in 1921. Meanwhile, he had begun to work as a teacher at various schools, moving to a new school in Otterthal in September 1924, where this photograph was taken. It was during a lesson in April 1926 that Wittgenstein hit one of his pupils, the 11-year-old Josef Haidbauer, two or three times on the head, and the boy collapsed unconscious. During the inevitable fall-out and ensuing trial, Wittgenstein resigned and returned to Vienna, where he took a job as an assistant gardener in the Brothers of Mercy monastery in Hütteldorf. The infamous affair became known as the Haidbauer incident, or Der Vorfall Haidbauer, in Austria.

The Clements were a family in Swansea with whom Wittgenstein lodged for a while and later stayed as a guest. He took part in their family life, having meals with them, playing board games, and taking an active interest in their two daughters' education. (3)

The diagram shows the sun and the discovered planets and their relative size. Uranus, which was discovered in 1846 is shown. CONDITIONS OF SALE AND BUSINESS

- The Seller warrants to the Auctioneer and the buyer that he is the true owner or is properly authorised to sell the property by the true owner and is able to transfer good and marketable title to the property free from any third party claims.
- (a) The highest bidder to be the buyer. If during the auction the Auctioneer considers that a dispute has arisen he has absolute authority to settle it or re-offer the lot. The Auctioneer may at his sole discretion determine the advance of bidding or refuse a bid, divide any lot, combine any two or more lots or withdraw any lot without prior notice.
 - (b) Where goods are bought at auction by a buyer who has entered into an agreement with another or others that the other or others (or some of them) shall abstain from bidding for the goods and the buyer or other party or one of the other parties is a dealer (as defined in the Auction Biddings Agreement Act 1927) the buyer warrants that the goods are bought bona fide on joint account.
- 3. The buyer shall pay the price at which a lot is knocked down by the Auctioneer to the buyer ("the hammer price") together with a premium of 20% of the hammer price. Where the lot is marked by an asterisk the premium will be subject to VAT at 20% which under the Auctioneer's Margin Scheme will form part of the buyer's premium on our invoice and will not be separately identified (the premium added to the hammer price will hereafter collectively be referred to as "the total sum due"). By making any bid the buyer acknowledges that his attention has been drawn to the fact that on the sale of any lot the Auctioneer will receive from the seller commission at its usual rates in addition to the said premium of 20% and assents to the Auctioneer receiving the said commission.
- (a) The buyer shall forthwith upon the purchase give in his name and permanent address and pay to the Auctioneer immediately after the conclusion of the auction the total sum due.
 - (b) The buyer may be required to pay down during the course of the sale the whole or any part of the total sum due, and if he fails to do so after such request the lot or lots may at the Auctioneer's absolute discretion be put up again and resold immediately.
 - (c) The buyer shall at his own expense take away any lot or lots purchased no later than five working days after the auction day.
 - (d) The Auctioneer may at his own discretion agree credit terms with a buyer and extend the time limits for collection in special cases but otherwise payment shall be deemed to have been made only after the Auctioneer has received cash or a sterling banker's draft or the buyer's cheque has been cleared.
- 5. (a) If the buyer fails to pay for or take away any lot or lots pursuant to clause 4 or breaches any other condition of that clause the Auctioneer as agent for the seller shall be entitled after consultation with the seller to exercise one or other of the following rights:
 - (i) Rescind the sale of that or any other lots sold to the buyer who defaults and re-sell the lot or lots whereupon the defaulting buyer shall pay to the Auctioneer any shortfall between the proceeds of that sale after deduction of costs of re-sale and the total sum due. Any surplus shall belong to the seller.
 - (ii) Proceed for damages for breach of contract.
 - (b) Without prejudice to the Auctioneer's rights hereunder if any lots or lots are not collected within five days or such longer period as the Auctioneer may have agreed otherwise, the Auctioneer may charge the buyer a storage charge of £1.00 + VAT at the current rate per lot per day.
 - (c) Ownership of the lot purchased shall not pass to the buyer until he has paid to the Auctioneer the total sum due.
- 6. (a) The seller shall be entitled to place a reserve on any lot and the Auctioneer shall have the right to bid on behalf of the seller for any lot on which a reserve has been placed. A seller may not bid on any lot on which a reserve has been placed.

 - (c) If such arrangements are not made within seven days of the notification the Auctioneer is empowered to sell the lot by auction or by private treaty at not less than the reserve price and to receive from the seller the normal selling commission and special expenses.

- 7. Any representation or statement by the Auctioneer in any catalogue, brochure or advertisement of forthcoming sales as to authorship, attribution, genuineness, origin, date, age, provenance, condition or estimated selling price is a statement of opinion only. Every person interested should exercise and rely on his own judgement as to such matters and neither the Auctioneer nor his servants or agents are responsible for the correctness of such opinions. No warranty whatsoever is given by the Auctioneer or the seller in respect of any lot and any express or implied warranties are hereby excluded.
- 8. (a) Notwithstanding any other terms of these conditions, if within fourteen days of the sale the Auctioneer has received from the buyer of any lot notice in writing that in his view the lot is a deliberate forgery and within fourteen days after such notification the buyer returns the same to the Auctioneer in the same condition as at the time of the sale and satisfies the Auctioneer that considered in the light of the entry in the catalogue the lot is a deliberate forgery then the sale of the lot will be rescinded and the purchase price of the same refunded. "A deliberate forgery" means a lot made with intention to deceive.
 - (b) A buyer's claim under this condition shall be limited to any amount paid to the Auctioneer for the lot and for the purpose of this condition the buyer shall be the person to whom the original invoice was made out by the Auctioneer.
- 9. Lots may be removed during the sale after full settlement in accordance with 4(d) hereof.
- 10. All goods delivered to the Auctioneer's premises will be deemed to be delivered for sale by auction unless otherwise stated in writing and will be catalogued and sold at the Auctioneer's discretion and accepted by the Auctioneer subject to all these conditions. - 11. (a) Unless otherwise instructed in writing all goods on the Auctioneer's premises and in their custody will be held insured against the risks of fire, burglary, water damage and accidental breakage or damage. The value of the goods so covered will be the hammer price, or in the case of unsold lots the lower estimate, or in the case of loss or damage prior to the sale that which the specialised staff of the Auctioneer shall in their absolute discretion estimate to be the auction value of such goods.
 - (b) The Auctioneer shall not be responsible for damage to or the loss, theft, or destruction of any goods not so insured because of the owner's written instructions.
