FOREWORD

'O, let my books be then the eloquence
And dumb presagers of my speaking breast,
Who plead for love and look for recompense
More than that tongue that more hath more expressed.'

(William Shakespeare, Sonnet 23)

William Foyle (1883-1963), one of the greatest booksellers of the 20th century, was the co-founder with his brother Gilbert of the eponymous and iconic London bookshop on Charing Cross Road. Having purchased the former medieval monastery of Beeleigh Abbey in 1943, William built an impressive and unrivalled personal library of manuscripts and books on English history and literature, European and world history and discovery, which he housed in the beautiful former monastic dormitory. After William's death in 1963 the abbey and library passed to his daughter Christina, who ran the Foyle's empire in a notoriously idiosyncratic manner until her own death in 1999.

Following Christina's death the abbey and library were sold. This landmark 3-day sale of the Foyle Library by Christie's took place in July 2000, and at the time stood as the most valuable English private library ever to be offered in Britain or Europe. With much international fanfare the sale achieved a world record total, but it was not common knowledge that, in a private arrangement with the auction house prior to sale, a significant portion of the original collection was acquired by William's grandson Christopher, the nephew of Christina.

Christopher and his wife Catherine were also able to buy the abbey, and so not only did Christopher work to revive the Foyle's bookshop brand but he also rebuilt the book collection and, with Catherine, undertook a significant and sympathetic restoration of the abbey and gardens to much public acclaim.

Following the highly successful sale of the first portion of treasured texts collected by both William and Christopher Foyle by Dominic Winter Auctioneers on 27 September 2023, we are delighted to present the final portion of the Foyle Library for sale by auction. While the first part was rich in illuminated Books of Hours and printed texts from the Renaissance and early modern period, this second portion generally lays stronger emphasis on the Georgian and Victorian eras, although there are early printed books and manuscripts, including a trove of medieval and later Essex documents, as well as 17th-century English literature and history. The lion's share of the sale comprises books from the nineteenth and twentieth centuries, in which the dominant theme is fine leather bindings bound by Zaehnsdorf, Sangorski & Sutcliffe, Riviere, Bayntun, et al. On a closer look however, it becomes apparent that many of the books in this remarkable collection have at least one second string to their bow.

Within this catalogue are to be found numerous books with fore-edge paintings, Cosway-style bindings with miniatures (mostly commissioned by William Foyle from Bayntun Riviere following the firms' merger in 1939), and dozens of profusely extra-illustrated works. The extra illustrations comprise not only period and earlier engravings but watercolours and many notable autograph letters. One such example can be found at lot 252; this two-volume work of the life and adventures of the writer George Sala has been expanded into 9 volumes by the insertion over 300 autograph letters and countless portraits and views by the infamous book grangeriser Alexander Meyrick Broadley (1847-1916).

The names of William Shakespeare and Charles Dickens appear several times throughout the catalogue, in manuscript and print, so it is fitting that the sale has an intriguing contemporary oil portrait of the young Charles Dickens, and an oil version of the Chandos portrait of Shakespeare, formerly belonging to the famous Shakespeare collector, the Earl of Warwick. The sale concludes with library furniture from the Foyle library at Beeleigh Abbey and as the tail-piece to the Foyle Library story, a fine marble bust of Shakespeare after Roubiliac.

We would like to renew our gratitude to Cathy Foyle for entrusting this important library to our care, and to Matthew Butler for his careful assistance throughout.





1* Essex Deeds. A group of 8 medieval vellum deeds relating to land and property in Essex, c. 1280-1456:

Grant of rent, c. 1280, Robert son of John Haldan of Barstable (Berdestaple) to Ralph de la Kersevere, clerk, and his wife Agnes, for their service, a rent of 2s 6d from a messuage in the hamlet of Brentwood (Bosci Arsi) in the vill of South Weald (Suthwalda), formerly William le Saltere (between the messuage formerly Goscelin Pake and the messuage formerly Durant, called Dez, to hold of Robert, with the homages, reliefs and escheats by the rent of a clove at Easter for all services; freedom of alienation except to religious houses and Jews; Witnesses: Robert Reyner, Henry Page, Anselm Marscall, Alan Pollard, Geoffrey the baker (pistor), Richard de Thorundone, John the skinner (pelliparius), Robert Page, Stephen Rikedun.

Grant of rents; Sunday after the feast of St Peter's chains 10 Edward III (4 August 1336), Henry de Lungchaump, knight, to Johnson of John de Naylingherst of Stisted [in Essex], 1) 23 shillingsworth of rent to be taken yearly from Edmund de Shulred of Stisted from all the lands and tenements which he lately held of Henry in the vill of Stisted, both in demesne and in service, together with the suit of court with which the lands and tenements are charged; 2) 5 shillingsworth of rent to be taken yearly from Adam Martyn from the lands and tenements which were formerly of his father Richard Martyn, deceased, together with the suit of court with which the lands and tenements are charged; To hold with the fealties, reliefs, heriots, escheats and suits of court belonging to the rent, Witnesses: Robert Pycot, John de Claryng, John de Nolhey, William Pycot, John in the Frith; at Stisted; endorsed, c.1440: called Shelreds and Martens; c. 1640: No 186.





The Fioretti, or *Little Flowers of Saint Francis of Assisi* is the title given to a classic collection of popular legends about the life of St. Francis of Assisi and his early companions, being a translation into Italian of the latin text *Actus B. Francisci et Sociorum Ejus* (the earliest extant manuscript version of which is dated 1390). The Italian text, one of the most delightful literary works of the Middle Ages, is thought to be by the Tuscan friar Ugolino Brunforte.


A letter from J. P. Gilson, Department of Manuscripts, British Museum, 30 January 1926, is included with the lot. Replying to the unidentified correspondents Gilson states: 'All that we have connected with Ferrers is a MS (Cotton MS. Cleop.A.XI) of Berteville's account of the expedition into Scotland, 1547, given by the author to Edward VI and by him to Ferrers' and noting that the inscription may or may not be Ferrers' autograph.

George Ferrers was a courtier and writer, and as a writer he is best remembered for his contributions to *The Mirror for Magistrates*. He apparently wrote plays for court performance but none were published and no manuscripts are extant.

Ferrers also played a key role in the development of parliamentary privilege. While sitting as a member of parliament for Plymouth in 1542 he was arrested for a debt and put in a debtors' prison in Bread Street. The arrest had been effected while he was on his way to the House of Commons, and Ferrers' fellow members ordered the Serjeant-at-Arms to obtain Ferrers' release. Eventually, the matter was referred to the Privy Council, and the King claimed privilege for his servants' attendance upon the business of parliament and thus the 'Ferrers Case' established the immunity of members of the Commons from civil arrest while the House was in session.




Cecil (William, 1520-1598), 1st Baron Burghley, English statesman, the chief adviser of Queen Elizabeth I for most of her reign, twice Secretary of State (1550-1553 and 1558-1572) and Lord High Treasurer from 1572. Document Signed, "W. Burghley", 8 May 1594, being a warrant, in a clerk's hand but signed by William [Cecil], Lord Burghley, instructing his former secretary Vincent Skinner, now Auditor of the Receipt of the Exchequer, to issue £100 to Sir Roger Williams for his ambassadorial mission to Henri IV of France, as the queen's warrant has not yet been signed, dated 8 May 1594; annotated by Skinner with instructions to Mr Taylor, one of the tellers, to pay the amount, and that that this warrant would be replaced with a further order, whereupon this warrant is to be cancelled, dated 13 May 1594, a little spotting, old bookseller's brief printed catalogue entry pasted to lower left blank margin, one page, folio [tipped in opposite p. 23] For William Cecil (1520-1597), Lord Burghley, Lord Treasurer, see ODNB.


Sir Roger Williams (1539/40-1595), soldier and author, was a flamboyant Welshman who fought on the continent from 1557, between 1574 and 1577 in the Spanish army of Flanders (where he may have served as an intelligence agent on behalf of Sir Francis Walsingham). Williams spent the Armada year, 1588, in England. He helped to prepare the English militia to do battle with the Spanish (whose military methods he knew so well) and was second in command, to Essex, of the cavalry of the army gathered at Tilbury. Elizabeth had always tolerated rather than liked Williams, but in 1594 he was finally granted a life pension of £300 a year. In that year and in 1595 he was sent as special ambassador to Henri IV. These appointments reflect his special expertise in French affairs and friendship with the French king, but also perhaps a growing acceptance of him by Elizabeth—and probably most of all the influence at court of his patron, Essex. Williams died of fever on 12 December 1595 after a four-day illness, with Essex at his side. His extensive *ODNB* entry endorses the speculation that he might have served as the model for Fluellen, the fiery yet witty, consummate Welsh professional soldier in Shakespeare's *Henry* V.

Vincent Skinner (c. 1540–1616) entered Trinity College in Cambridge in 1557 and Lincoln's Inn in 1565, occupied administrative positions in Lincolnshire between 1575 and 1583. He may already have been in Burghley's service in 1571, when he was elected MP for Truro, the first of his eight parliamentary seats. A puritan, he was serving as Burghley's secretary by at least 1578. Skinner left Burghley's personal service in 1593, when he became auditor of the receipt, by that time the principal office in the lower Exchequer. His career after this date was an unhappy one, and he died intestate at a debtor's prison on 28 February 1616 (History of Parliament).

Burghley's inability to obtain proper authorisation for this payment can be explained by the queen's itinerary: on 7 May 1594 Elizabeth arrived at Lambeth Palace, where she remained until departing for Wimbledon, the house of Burghley's son Sir Thomas Cecil, on 11 May. Wilkes (John, 1725–1797), English radical journalist and politician, magistrate, essayist and soldier, Lord Mayor of London 1774–75. 

James VI authorises 'William Chisholme, brother germane to oure Lieut. Sir James Chisholme of Cromlix to return and remain in Scotland for one year after his arrivall within oure said realme without any pane trouble molestation or danger', and Henry IV asks that the Bishop of Vaison may be favourably received in Scotland. William Chisholm's declaration refers to the settlement of a financial matter with his nephew, James Chisholm, and the Cardinal of Lorraine orders a payment to be made to the Bishop of Dunblane [i.e. William Chisholm II, uncle of William Chisholm III, Bishop of Vaison]. William Chisholm III (d. 1629), the subject of the first letter, belonged to a distinguished family of Scottish ecclesiastics. He succeeded his uncle by special papal licence as Bishop of Vaison in 1584, and an influential group of catholics in Scotland schemed to have him made a cardinal in order to represent James VI's interests at Rome. James however repudiated their efforts, and Chisholm remained at Vaison. His uncle, William Chisholm II, was, as Bishop of Dunblane, used by Mary, Queen of Scots as her envoy to the Pope to obtain leave for her marriage with Darnley in 1565, and to France in 1567 to inform the court of her marriage to Bothwell. Exiled from Scotland on her abdication, he was appointed Bishop of Vaison in 1570.

The survey provides rentals, court rolls, tenures, liberties and other details of Rich's property in Braintree, Rochford, Rayleigh, Great Waltham, Hatfield Broad Oak, South Shoebury and other parishes in Essex, as well as documents relating to titles and 'offices after the death' of members of the Rich family and others. The latest documents transcribed are dated 1610.

Robert Rich is best known as husband to Penelope Rich, Sir Philip Sidney's 'Stella' (who in the sonnet sequence Astrophel and Stella had 'no misfortune but that rich she is'); the two divorced in 1605. Rich was one of the wealthiest men in the kingdom, and, apparently for that reason, was created Earl of Warwick on 6 August 1618, and died on 24 March following. The manuscript is likely to have passed to the Earls (later Dukes) of Manchester through Anne, daughter of Robert Rich, 2nd Earl of Warwick, who married Edward Montagu, 2nd Earl of Manchester, in 1626.



Sir William Lee was appointed Latin secretary to King George I in 1718, and ten years later was named attorney-general to Frederick Prince of Wales. In 1727 he was elected to Parliament for Chipping Wycombe through his family's interest, and served until he was appointed a puisne justice of the King's Bench in 1730. He became Lord Chief Justice in 1737, succeeding his friend and colleague Lord Hardwicke. Lee served as Lord Chief Justice until his death, and was praised for his ability and impartiality as a judge. His court ruled that women who paid parish rates were entitled to vote in elections of parish officers. Lee presided at several of the treason trials of Jacobite rebels held by the special commission at Southwark in 1746.

A substantial collection of maxims, aphorisms and other quotations from classical authors arranged under headings, mostly in Latin and Greek, with an occasional entry or note in English. 



The volume contains brief messages from the faculty of Copenhagen University, the staff of colleges at Roskilde and Køge, five bishops and the incumbents of churches in the city of Copenhagen. Most signatories identify themselves by their office but when they fail to do, Tate had added that information in his distinctive hand.

Among the signatories is Ole Worm (13 May 1588 - 31 August 1654), a Danish physician and polymath and founder of the Wormian Museum, who taught Greek, Latin, physics and medicine; Thomas Bang (1600-1661), professor of Hebrew and then of theology, and in his later years Keeper of the Royal Library; the bishops of Aalborg, Lund (Skåne), Ribe, Viborg and Zealand, and Thomas Lindeman, the German pastor at Copenhagen. Almost all the contributors display their erudition by heading their entry with a biblical or classical quotation in Latin, Greek, Hebrew or Arabic.

The inscriptions are generally flattering of Tate's character and learning, and some describe him as a candidate of philosophy and theology. Tate maintained the book during the first ten months of 1648, and almost from the beginning the signatories express good wishes for his safe return to England. Unless he made several journeys home, it should perhaps be assumed that Tate spent what was perhaps his last year in Denmark collecting the signatures.

On 1 September 1648 Thomas Bang wrote introducing himself to John Selden (1584–1654, lawyer and historical and linguistic






scholar). The letter was to be carried by Richard Tate, a student of sound learning, an Englishman 'but hitherto a Dane by residence, and by breeding in liberal studies'; he assures Selden will not regret any favour shown to Tate, to whom any reply can be entrusted. The entries in Tate's *Liber* show little space for a journey to England and back in the September of 1648. Bang wrote again to Selden on 2 May 1652, expressing Tate's desire again to be his messenger, to which he has agreed on account of Tate's 'irreproachable life among them' (Seaton).

If the identification in *Alumni* is correct, Richard Tate matriculated at King's Cambridge in 1640, received a BA in 1645 and an MA from Magdalene in 1649, and was licensed as a schoolmaster at Kirby Misperton in Yorkshire (to which the book was presented under the misapprehension that he had been its rector) on 2 August 1661. He was ordained priest by archbishop Accepted Frewen on 17 August 1662, licensed to preach as curate on 23 September and on 14 November inducted as rector of Bilton, just outside York; he was buried there on 1 May 1680. Tate was the father of Matthew Tate (1662–1759), who served several livings in Berkshire, Buckinghamshire and Wiltshire. The origins of the family have not been established.







A series of administrative documents giving a picture of the workings of the Navy Board in 1669 under Samuel Pepys' control. Pepys was made Clerk of the Acts of the Navy on 23 June 1660 at the age of 27. He filled the role with considerable distinction at a time when the administration of the Navy was being modernised; a contemporary account declares him the most useful minister ever to have occupied his position. The period 1668-70 was an important one for the Navy Board and Pepys with the disasters of the Second Dutch War leaving the Board open to Parliamentary investigation of its numerous abuses; Pepys became the Board's chief defender, in particular in a magnificent performance before the House of Commons on 5 March 1669. From 1669 he was to be effectively in charge of the Navy.

The other signatories of the documents in this collection naturally feature prominently in Pepys' diaries: William, 2nd Viscount Brouncker (1620?–1684) was a friend of both Pepys and John Evelyn; a mathematician and translator of Descartes, he was the first President of the Royal Society. Admiral Sir John Mennes (1599–1671) was Comptroller of the Navy and a minor poet; Pepys' diaries describe him as excellent company, but are scathing about his failing abilities in his post, describing him as one of those who 'sit and do nothing'. Admiral Sir Jeremy Smith (d. 1675) was a commissioner of the Navy from 1669 as Comptroller of Victualling.

Pepys' failing eyesight caused him to give up his diaries during the course of the year covered by these documents, on 31 May 1669.




Pepys (Samuel, 1633-1703), English diarist and naval administrator. Autograph Letter Signed, 'S. William Brereton, 3rd Baron Brereton FRS (1631-1680) was an English mathematician and politician who sat in the House of Commons in 1659 and became Baron Brereton in the Irish peerage in 1664. He was chairman of the Committee of Accounts, better known as the Brooke House Committee, in 1667-1670. In that capacity he clashed repeatedly with Samuel Pepys, whose description of Brereton in his Second Diary, or Brooke House Journal, although no doubt biased, is the best portrait we have of the man.

Samuel Pepys visited the 17th-century country house Audley End and described it his diary entry for 8 October 1667: 'At last, rose, and up, and broke our fast, and then took coach, and away, and at Newport did call on Mr. Lowther, and he and his friend, and the master of the house, their friend, where they were, a gentleman, did presently get a-horseback and overtook us, and went with us to Audley-End, and did go along with us all over the house and garden: and mighty merry we were. The house indeed do appear very fine, but not so fine as it hath heretofore to me; particularly the ceilings are not so good as I always took them to be, being nothing so well wrought as my Lord Chancellor's are; and though the figure of the house without be very extraordinary good, yet the stayre-case is exceeding poor; and a great many pictures, and not one good one in the house but one of Harry the Eighth, done by Holben; and not one good suit of hangings in all the house, but all most ancient things, such as I would not give the hanging-up of in my house; and the other furniture, beds and other things, accordingly.'

Thomas Hollis FRS FRSA (1720-1774) was a political philosopher, Dissenter and Republican and author. He was a wealthy man having inherited from his father, grandfather and uncle. Hollis advanced his views to others by having books that promoted his beliefs specially bound and presented to friends and institutions within the UK and abroad, notably to Harvard Library following the serious fire in 1764. The majority of volumes bound for Hollis were covered in red Morocco with specially cut emblematic decorative tools designed by the Italian painter and engraver Giovanni Battista Cipriani (1727-1785, who resided in London from 1755). His principal bookbinder from circa 1759 to 1769 was John Matthewman (and business partner John Bailey). In June 1764 a large fire broke out at the Matthewman and Bailey bookshop and bindery causing a great deal of damage and the loss of three lives. As a consequence of the fire new emblematic tools were cut by the engraver Thomas Pingo. In March 1766 the bindery workshop suffered severe financial difficulties and eventual bankruptcy which was announced in the newspapers at the time. The failure of the business was reported to have been caused by Matthewman's business partner John Bailey. The business continued for a short while until 21 June 1769 when Matthewman absconded to avoid the debtor's prison.

He became a lieutenant-general in the Russian army, was a hero of the War of 1812 against Napoleon's invasion of Russia, and later Russian ambassador at Sweden. A true bibliomaniac, his enormous library was acquired by the Russian government in 1836, being delivered by warship to St. Petersburg.

Rare. Divided into three topographical parts and three historical parts, this set of volumes provides detailed information on military topography and reconnaissance, including surveys of the Tyrol and Black Forest, as well as a history of the Dépôt Général de la Guerre, and a list of the best available published maps of the various parts of Europe.

The Dépôt Général de la Guerre, which was in charge of military mapping for the French army, published this *Mémorial* around the same time as plans were afoot to create a training school for military engineers, dedicated to geodesic surveying, field surveys, and cartography, which became known as the Ecole des ingenieurs-geographes, created in 1809.

Beaufoy's copies of the first four folios of Shakespeare were auctioned separately by Christie's on July 16 1912. Ann Radcliffe is best known for her Gothic novels, especially *The Mysteries of Udolpho* and *The Italian*. After her death her books influenced authors such as Mary Shelley, Sir Walter Scott, Edgar Allen Poe and The Brontë Sisters. Her poetry, however, is less well known and little attention seems to have been paid to this 'Metrical Tale' which was first published after her death as part of her *Posthumous Works*, [with a Memoir of the Author by Thomas Noon Talfourd], 4 volumes, (London: Henry Colburn, 1826). The poem deals mainly with the War of the Roses and the Battle of St Albans, but the first Canto is devoted to the Abbey itself, its history and its present state. The transcriber of this fair copy is unidentified but the text conforms to the one published across volumes 3 & 4 of the *Posthumous Works*. The references for the Notes at the end are the same but the wording in the manuscript varies with the printed version and is often briefer.

An early portrait of Charles Dickens attributed, according to the frame plaque, to the portraitist Daniel Maclise (1806-1870). Maclise painted several portraits of Dickens and his family, the most famous being the full-length oil of 1839 in the National Portrait Gallery (NPG 1172), which was used as the frontispiece for Nicholas Nickleby when it was first published later that year. He and the author were great friends, and Maclise contributed illustrations for The Old Curiosity Shop and several of the Christmas books: The Chimes, The Cricket on the Hearth, and The Battle of Life.

We have been unable to find the present work mentioned in any listing of the known portraits of Dickens. It is unusual in showing the author with his hair parted on the left, rather than on the right. Dickens is known to have been first photographed in 1841 at Richard Beard's establishment, soon after Beard had opened England's first daguerreotype studio. This early photographic image of Dickens, now sadly lost, would likely have shown a clean-shaven man of twenty-nine with flowing hair parted on the left, since most daguerreotype processes produced a reversed image. It is not impossible to suppose, therefore, that this portrait might have been copied from that early image of the author. (1)

A copy of the famous Chandos portrait of William Shakespeare, formerly in the Earl of Warwick's Shakespeare collection at Warwick Castle.

The only portrait of Shakespeare that has a good claim to have been painted from life, the Chandos picture is thought to have been painted by John Taylor (circa 1580-1653) between 1600 and 1610. It is listed as the first work in the collection of the National Portrait Gallery, London, having been given to the Gallery on its foundation in 1856, and it is named after the 3rd Duke of Chandos, who formerly owned the painting.

The Earl of Warwick referred to on the exhibition label is the bibliophile, collector, and Shakespeare enthusiast George Guy Greville, 4th Earl of Warwick (1818-1893). Greville, a Tory MP, spent much of the years between 1852 and 1870 assembling at Warwick Castle an impressive collection of books, manuscripts and paintings relating to Shakespeare. He was a frequent customer of the Shakespearean scholar and collector James Orchard Halliwell-Phillipps (1820-1889), one of the pre-eminent bibliographer-booksellers of Shakespeare of his day. Halliwell-Phillipps co-founded the Shakespeare Society when he was only 22, and he later sold to the British Museum the then second known copy of the 1603 Hamlet and a mortgage deed signed by the playwright himself. The Folger Shakespeare Library purchased the Warwick Castle Shakespeare Library in 1897; the transaction was Henry Folger's first major purchase of a collection.

The exhibition label on the back of the present work would appear to refer to the 1890 Exhibition of the Royal House of Tudor at The New Gallery in Regent Street. Number 392 in this exhibition was a half-length portrait of Shakespeare belonging to the Earl of Warwick, although this painting showed the playwright 'half-length, to right, black doublet, lace ruff and cuffs, right hand on hip, left hand holding gloves: on background, shield of arms ... '.


The record of the final arrangements for Dickens's purchase of Gad's Hill Place, outside Rochester, Kent. 'The spot and the very house are literally "a dream of my childhood", as he wrote to Wills in February 1855, on discovering that it was for sale. The first letters of this polite and cordial correspondence concern Hindle's tenancy, Wills conveying Dickens consent to Hindle remaining there until Lady Day, 1857, and asserting that 'Mr Dickens has no wish whatever to allow any active operations that would intrude upon, or disturb you to be begun until entirely given up possession'. Dickens's letter announces that his purchase is complete, requesting Hindle to pay rent to Wills, who sends Hindle a receipt for £51-6-8 for half a year's rent less income tax. Subsequently the correspondence turns to fixtures which Dickens will inspect and value, including fireplaces, grates and a kitchen range, to the visit of a builder 'to take dimensions' for repairs, and to final arrangements for Hindle's hay and wine.



Gad's Hill Place was built in 1779 by Alderman Stevens, a brewer of Rochester. It then became the property of the Rev. James Lynn, whose duties later took him to Cumberland; and in 1855 was rented by the Rev. Joseph Hindle. Dickens had seen the house as a child, when walking with his father from Chatham. His father is said to have pointed it out to him as the spot where he might one day live himself if only he worked hard enough. After protracted negotiations with the seller, Dickens paid £1,790 for the house and, the repairs complete, moved in during the summer of 1857. It was to be his country residence until his death. William Henry ('Harry') Wills was engaged as Dickens's assistant on Household Words in 1849, and was entrusted with all his private business arrangements.


The first volume includes an explanatory leaf regarding the composition of the set, written by William Boyne (1815–1893), 'I cannot learn positively who made the drawings in this book, but I have been told that they were principally done by Mr. Thomas Johnson son of the Lord Mayor in 1841. Mr Johnson lived at Upminster near Hornchurch..., he died in 1861. I bought the collection by auction at Messrs Sotheby, Wilkinson, & Hodge, [as 2 volumes and drawings in 9 portfolios]. Since the purchase I have had most of the pencil drawings coloured with sepia, the artist dying before the whole were completed. I have also added many other illustrations, as well as arranged the whole series, which were a complete confusion. Chelsea July 1865, Wm. Boyne'. Charles and Catherine Dickens had ten children, the youngest being Edward Bulwer Lytton Dickens (1852-1902). Plorn (short for Plornishmaroonitgoonter, so nicknamed by his father) left England in September 1868 for Australia, joining his brother Alfred Tennyson, who was already established there as a successful sheep farmer. The cheque from his father at the front of the volume was given to him when he went to Australia. In 1890 Plorn represented Wilcannia in the New South Wales Parliament, but resigned shortly afterwards. He then received an appointment as Rabbit Inspector for the Government of New South Wales, and subsequently was the Officer of the Lands Department in charge of the Moree district, where he died after an illness of some months.

A short typewritten description of the volume list the various types of illustrations added to this copy: 'about 87 old engraved portraits, about 35 other portraits, about 62 engraved title pages or other leaves from original old books, about 51 printer's devices from original books, about 60 original engravings and woodcuts from old books, about 14 reproductions of bindings, about 6 reproductions from illuminated manuscripts, about 34 other illustrations'. One of the earliest specimens is an early woodcut or xylographic illustration printed in brown, possibly depicting the Three Wise Men, inscribed in a 17th-century hand in brown ink to verso 'Mom Britium Mediolanensis' (a reference to the Italian humanist Boninus Mombritius (circa 1424-1502), who edited a number of early texts including the Santuarium seu Vitae Sanctorum).

Early woodcut and engraved portraits include Lorenzo Coster by Larmessin after Van Campen. An engraved portrait of Burchiello by Ascanio Lucani, engraved portrait of Sebastian Brant, Pico della Mirandola by De Bry (1650), Maximilian of Austria by De Jode after Lucas van Leyden, circa 1620, woodcut colophon portrait John Day (1562), engraved portrait of Nicolaus Bruyant by Pontius after Van Dyck.

An extraordinary example of book grangerisation by the notable exponent, Alexander Meyrick Broadley (1847-1916), also known as Broadley Pasha. Broadley was a British barrister, author, company promoter and social figure. He is best known for being the defence lawyer for Ahmed 'Urabi after the failure of the 'Urabi Revolt. Following a colourful life he spent his last fifteen years devoted to writing and book collecting. He made significant acquisitions of manuscript material, accumulating original letters and documents, some of which he relates in his book Chats on Autographs. His library included 135 works he had 'grangerised' by adding additional illustrations, which then amounted to about 600 volumes. While some of the autograph letters listed in the manuscript indexes at the front of each volume have since disappeared (notably Oscar Wilde and Hester Piozzi), the majority are still present and appear to have largely remained undisturbed in the Foyle Library for many decades.

INFORMATION FOR BUYERS

AFTER THE AUCTION

Online Results: If you weren't present or able to follow the auction live, you can find results for the sale on our website shortly after the sale has ended.

Payment: The price you pay is the amount at which the auctioneer's hammer falls (the hammer price), plus a buyer's premium (a percentage of the final hammer price) and vat where applicable. You will be issued with an invoice made out to the name and address provided on your registration form.

Please note successful bids made via live bidding cannot be invoiced or paid for until the day after an auction. A live bidding fee of 3% + VAT (Dominic Winter / Invaluable) or 4.95% + VAT (the-saleroom) will be added to your invoice.

METHODS OF PAYMENT

Cheque: Cheques will only be accepted on the day of the sale by prior arrangement (please contact our office for further information). Cheques by post will be accepted but a period of 5 working days will be required for the cheque to clear before purchases can be collected or posted.

Cash: Payments can be made at the Cashier's Office, either during or after the sale.

Debit Card: There is no additional charge for purchases made with debit cards in the UK.

Credit Cards: We accept Visa and Mastercard. It is advisable to let your card provider know in advance if you are intending to purchase. This reduces the time needed to obtain authorisation when the payment is made.

Bank Transfer: All transfers must state the relevant invoice number. If transferring from a foreign currency, the amount we receive must be the total due after the currency conversion and the deduction of any bank charges.

Note to Overseas Clients: All payments must be made by bank transfer only. No card payments will be accepted unless by special prior arrangements with the auctioneers.

Collection/Postage/Delivery: If you attend the auction in person and are successful in your bid, you are free to collect your item once payment has been made.

Successful commission or live bids will be invoiced to you the day after the sale. When it is possible for our in-house packing department to send your purchase(s), a charge for postage/packing/insurance will be included in your invoice. Where it is not possible for our in-house packing department to send your item you will be required to make your own arrangements or to contact Mailboxes etc (tel: 01793 525009) or Pack and Send (tel: 01635 887237) who may be able to help.

We provide a monthly delivery service to Central London, usually on Wednesday of the week following an auction. Payment must be received before this option can be requested. A charge will be added to your invoice for this service.

ARTIST'S RESALE RIGHT LAW ("DROIT DE SUITE")

Lots marked with AR next to the lot number may be subject to Droit de Suite.

Droit de Suite is payable on the hammer price of any artwork sold in the lifetime of the artist, or within 70 years of the artist's death. The buyer agrees to pay Dominic Winter Auctioneers Ltd. an amount equal to the resale royalty and we will pay such amount to the artist's collecting agent. Resale royalty applies where the Hammer price is 1,000 Euros or more and the amount cannot be more than 12,500 Euros per lot.

The amount is calculated as follows:

Royalty For the Portion of the Hammer Price (in Euros)

4.00% up to 50,000

3.00% between 50,000.01 and 200,000 1.00% between 200,000.01 and 350,000 0.50% between 350,000.01 and 500,000

Invoices will, as usual, be issued in Pounds Sterling. For the purposes of calculating the resale royalty the Pounds Sterling/Euro rate of exchange will be the European Central Bank reference rate on the day of the sale.

CONDITIONS OF SALE AND BUSINESS

- The Seller warrants to the Auctioneer and the buyer that he is the true owner or is properly authorised to sell the property by the true owner and is able to transfer good and marketable title to the property free from any third party claims.
- 2. (a) The highest bidder to be the buyer. If during the auction the Auctioneer considers that a dispute has arisen he has absolute authority to settle it or re-offer the lot. The Auctioneer may at his sole discretion determine the advance of bidding or refuse a bid, divide any lot, combine any two or more lots or withdraw any lot without prior notice.
 - (b) Where goods are bought at auction by a buyer who has entered into an agreement with another or others that the other or others (or some of them) shall abstain from bidding for the goods and the buyer or other party or one of the other parties is a dealer (as defined in the Auction Biddings Agreement Act 1927) the buyer warrants that the goods are bought bona fide on joint account.
- 3. The buyer shall pay the price at which a lot is knocked down by the Auctioneer to the buyer ("the hammer price") together with a premium of 20% of the hammer price. Where the lot is marked by an asterisk the premium will be subject to VAT at 20% which under the Auctioneer's Margin Scheme will form part of the buyer's premium on our invoice and will not be separately identified (the premium added to the hammer price will hereafter collectively be referred to as "the total sum due"). By making any bid the buyer acknowledges that his attention has been drawn to the fact that on the sale of any lot the Auctioneer will receive from the seller commission at its usual rates in addition to the said premium of 20% and assents to the Auctioneer receiving the said commission.
- 4. (a) The buyer shall forthwith upon the purchase give in his name and permanent address and pay to the Auctioneer immediately after the conclusion of the auction the total sum due.
 - (b) The buyer may be required to pay down during the course of the sale the whole or any part of the total sum due, and if he fails to do so after such request the lot or lots may at the Auctioneer's absolute discretion be put up again and resold immediately.
 - (c) The buyer shall at his own expense take away any lot or lots purchased no later than five working days after the auction day.
 - (d) The Auctioneer may at his own discretion agree credit terms with a buyer and extend the time limits for collection in special cases but otherwise payment shall be deemed to have been made only after the Auctioneer has received cash or a sterling banker's draft or the buyer's cheque has been cleared.

Any surplus shall belong to the seller.

- 6. (a) The seller shall be entitled to place a reserve on any lot and the Auctioneer shall have the right to bid on behalf of the seller for any lot on which a reserve has been placed. A seller may not bid on any lot on which a reserve has been placed.
 - (b) Where any lot fails to sell, the Auctioneer shall notify the seller accordingly. The seller shall make arrangements either to re-offer the lot for sale or to collect the lot and may be asked to pay a commission not exceeding 50% of the selling commission and any special expenses incurred in cataloguing the lot.
 - (c) If such arrangements are not made within seven days of the notification the Auctioneer is empowered to sell the lot by auction or by private treaty at not less than the reserve price and to receive from the seller the normal selling commission and special expenses.

- 7. Any representation or statement by the Auctioneer in any catalogue, brochure or advertisement of forthcoming sales as to authorship, attribution, genuineness, origin, date, age, provenance, condition or estimated selling price is a statement of opinion only. Every person interested should exercise and rely on his own judgement as to such matters and neither the Auctioneer nor his servants or agents are responsible for the correctness of such opinions. No warranty whatsoever is given by the Auctioneer or the seller in respect of any lot and any express or implied warranties are hereby excluded.
- 8. (a) Notwithstanding any other terms of these conditions, if within fourteen days of the sale the Auctioneer has received from the buyer of any lot notice in writing that in his view the lot is a deliberate forgery and within fourteen days after such notification the buyer returns the same to the Auctioneer in the same condition as at the time of the sale and satisfies the Auctioneer that considered in the light of the entry in the catalogue the lot is a deliberate forgery then the sale of the lot will be rescinded and the purchase price of the same refunded.
 "A deliberate forgery" means a lot made with intention to deceive.
 - (b) A buyer's claim under this condition shall be limited to any amount paid to the Auctioneer for the lot and for the purpose of this condition the buyer shall be the person to whom the original invoice was made out by the Auctioneer.
- 9. Lots may be removed during the sale after full settlement in accordance with 4(d) hereof.
- 10. All goods delivered to the Auctioneer's premises will be deemed to be delivered for sale by auction unless otherwise stated in writing and will be catalogued and sold at the Auctioneer's discretion and accepted by the Auctioneer subject to all these conditions. In the case of miscellaneous books, the Auctioneer reserves the right to extract and dispose of books that, in the opinion of the Auctioneer at his absolute discretion, have no saleable value and, therefore, might detract from the saleability of the rest of the lot and the Auctioneer shall incur no liability to the seller, in respect of the books disposed of. By delivering the goods to the Auctioneer for inclusion in his auction sales each seller acknowledges that he/she accepts and agrees to all the conditions.
- 11. (a) Unless otherwise instructed in writing all goods on the Auctioneer's premises and in their custody will be held insured against the risks of fire, burglary, water damage and accidental breakage or damage. The value of the goods so covered will be the hammer price, or in the case of unsold lots the lower estimate, or in the case of loss or damage prior to the sale that which the specialised staff of the Auctioneer shall in their absolute discretion estimate to be the auction value of such goods.
 - (b) The Auctioneer shall not be responsible for damage to or the loss, theft, or destruction of any goods not so insured because of the owner's written instructions.
- 12. The Auctioneer shall remit the proceeds of the sale to the seller thirty days after the day of the auction provided that the Auctioneer has received the total sum due from the buyer. In all other cases the Auctioneer will remit the proceeds of the sale to the seller within seven days of the receipt by the Auctioneer of the total sum due. The Auctioneer will not be deemed to have received the total sum due until after any cheque delivered by the buyer has been cleared. In the event of the Auctioneer exercising his right to rescind the sale his obligation to the seller hereunder lapses.
- 13. In the case of the seller withdrawing instructions to the Auctioneer to sell any lot or lots, the Auctioneer may charge a fee of 12.5% of the Auctioneer's middle estimate of the auction price of the lot withdrawn together with Value Added Tax thereon and any expenses incurred in respect of the lot or lots.
- 14. The Auctioneer's current standard notices and information (i.e. Collation and Amendments) will apply to any contract with the Auctioneer as if incorporated herein.
- These conditions shall be governed by and construed in accordance with English Law.
